

GREEKS DEFEAT FREDERICTON

The Marathons went to Fredericton yesterday and won a good game of ball from the Fredericton team by a score of 10 to 3.

That the Marathons won from the Capital team was rather a surprise to the Fredericton fans, as they expected a great deal from their pitcher Reub Cram, who has just returned to Fredericton from College, and is rated as one of the best pitchers in the league.

Joe Tarbell pitched for the St. John team and was as steady as a church. While he was found for ten hits he managed to strike six of the Capitals out, and he twirled a great game throughout.

Despite the fact that there were errors there was some very fast baseball witnessed, and during the game Fredericton managed to pull off no less than four double plays, and the Marathons pulled off one double.

There was also some very fine playing in the field by the men on both teams. The Marathons went to bat first, and the first three men up were retired quickly. The first Fredericton man to bat struck out. Then Ganley hit to centre for two bases.

There was no more scoring in the next three innings, while some very good playing was made. But in the ninth two Marathons were hit by pitched balls, and three singles gave the St. John team three more runs and the game was over.

OFFICIAL TALKS OF SHAD CULTURE

Results from Hampton Hatchery were Fairly Encouraging Said Marine Department Man in City Yesterday.

"While the experiment in shad culture at Hampton this spring did not prove as successful as we expected, the results were fairly encouraging," said S. J. Walker, of the department of marine and fisheries, Ottawa, who was at the Royal yesterday.

"This is the first experiment in shad culture made in Canada, and the circumstances attending it were decidedly unfavorable. The high water and cold weather made the fishing out, and we were able to get only a small portion of the fish we wanted.
