UNCERTAIN ABOUT STEAMERS
The feeling of uncertainty in relation to the regular steamer business the coming season is increased by the fact that the British government is reported to have just commandered 100 additional steamers for transport service, besides officially announcing that it will at once proceed to regulate the travels of all British ships by means of license which will keep the vessels at all times subject to requisition orders for special trade or military service. Nothing is known here as to the identity of the 100 steamers just taken for war purposes, although it is generally believed that none of the transatlantic liners likely to come here during the winter are included in the list. The practical effect of the new order is that the British Admiralty proposes to regulate English tonnage all over the world, and would take no cognizance of trip or time charter arrangements their owners might have made provided the services of the vessels were needed for government purposes.—Portland Ar-

Lendon's oldest afternoon paper silenced because of attacks on Ministers and defiance of wishes of Official Press Bureau.

London, Nov. 6.—The printing plan of the London Globe, together with copies of the issues of yesterday and today, were seized by the police this atternoon.

The authorities acted presumably because of the article appearing in the Globe today, containing a bitter attack on Lord Haldane and declaring Kitchener had offered his resignation, which was declined. The Globe said the appointment of Lord Haldane to succeed Lord Kitchener would "jeopardize the life of the government."

The following official statement was issued:

"This afternoon Chief Inspector Fowler with other police officers, act has under the authority of Sir Francis boyd, K.C.B., a competent military authority, entered the premises of the Globe newspaper and seized all copies of the newspaper for yesterday and to-day, together with the printning plant and type."

The Globe had been inviting trouble for some time, virtually daring the authorities to take official notice of its disregard of some of the wishes of the official press bureau and of its unrestricted denunciation of members of the cabinet who incurred its wrath. An attack vesterday by the Globe on certain ministers in connection with the administration of the war office, and its positive reiteration coday that Secretary Kitchener had resigned, not withstanding official denials, seem to have decided the authorities on the suppression of the paper.

The Globe is controlled by Cecli Harmsworth, brother of Lord North-cliffe. It is the oldest afternoon newspaper of London,

A despatch from London today said the Globe again asserted War Secretary Kitchener had resigned, because of "manoeuvres and machinations," official denial was made yesterday and again today that the war secretary had resigned. It is possible that the Globe in this way may have incurred the displeasure of the London authorities.

The Globe while one of the oldest papers published in the country and for long considered a staid and conservative organ, has latterly lost that character, and has been chiefly noted for its violent attacks one public men luring the administration of the Liberal government.
