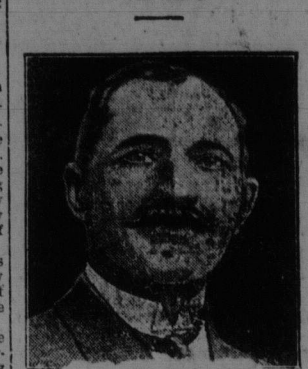

HIGHFIELD CHURCH IS BEING REBUILT

Corner Stone Laid Yesterday

—Work on Edifice now well Under way—Burned Year Ago.

Highfield, Sept. 19.—On Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 19th, an interesting ceremony was performed in Highfield. Over a year ago St. John's church, Highfield, was burned to the ground owing to a forest fire. Yesterday the corner stone of the new church was laid by Canon Scovell Neales, of Sussex.

Although the weather proved anything but kind yet a very large number of parishioners and other friends attended the ceremony. Among the clergy present besides the rector, Rev. C. A. S. Warneford, were Canon E. Neales, of Sussex; Rev. W. J. Wilkinson, Springfield; Rev. G. E. Tobin, Cambridge; Rev. William Smith, Gagetown. Although the corner stone was placed in position at yesterday's ceremony, yet a large portion of the building has already been completed through the untiring efforts of the popular rector, who has now been ministering to the parish for a space of seventeen years.

Many valuable gifts of furniture and money have been received towards the restoration not only from members of the congregation but from many well-wishers and friends of other denominations.

The occasion of laying the corner stone was the quarterly meeting of the rural deanery of the Kingsley Deanery which was held at Johnston rectory, where the clergy were the guests of Mrs. Warneford. The service of laying the corner stone took place at the usual deanery service, and it was very pleasing to see the way in which the large numbers turned out to the service.
