National Hockey League Matches

Ottawa Senators Walloped St. Patricks Seven to Two—Canadiens Defeat Hamilton Three to Two.

Ottawa, Jan. 11.—Ottawa's world champions, jumped into first place tonight in the race for honors in the National Hockey League series by virtue of a seven to two victory over the St. Patricks of Toronto at the local arena tonight. The win was clean cut and on the play there was no doubt that the locals were a vastly superior team. More than seven thousand persons were on hand to cheer their favorites, but the locals led all the way and there were few occasions to rouse the enthusiasm of the audience. It was the third meeting of the great rivals and the first victory obtained by the champions over their toughly opponents.

The Irishmen were not up to expectations. With the exception of a seven minute rally in the second period for a like space in the final period the visitors presented a listlessness that was not in keeping with their past performance. It looked as if several of the team had gone stale. The Ottawa's on the contrary were at the top of their form and played consistent and at times brilliant hockey.

Stuart was not at his best and after the first period, was little used. Gerard was the star of the Ottawa and Cy Denenny was a close second. The latter's shooting and following back were features of the play. Bell made his first appearance with the locals and made a fair showing in the short time he was on the ice. Stackhouse of the Toronto was used in the final minutes of the play but did not show much.

The match was exceptionally clean, not a player being ruled out. Roch was the only man to take the count, being struck by the puck in the face. A lady enthusiast was struck in the face by a high shot and had to be taken from the rink.

Hamilton, Jan. 11.—Hamilton went into the cellar position in the N. H. L. game tonight by losing to Canadiens 3 to 2 in a game that was fought by good hockey for most of the journey. Canadiens did not appear to be suffering a great deal through the loss of Lalonde, as the forward line they started out checked the "Hams" to a standstill and their offensive work was a treat to watch, only the good work of Lockhart in the last two periods saving the Hamiltons from a worse defeat. Eddie Boncher, who came here last winter to play with the Tigers and was refused an amateur card by the Amateur Union, played well as the Canadiens' forward line tonight and his good work was largely responsible for the Canadian's victory.

Fred Diggs is well known as the star skater who picked the colored champions of the South End League, the Royals, to victory last season.

Several others of the senior entrants have achieved considerable fame in local meets. C. H. Smith, Jr. of Moncton, is the star skater who won the East End rink at the time of the big meet last year.

\$54,000,000 BET IN PARI-MUTUEL MACHINES

Baltimore, Jan. 10.—The state's revenue in 1921 from the four one-mile race tracks in Maryland was \$54,125, the annual report of the state racing commission to the governor, made public today, disclosed. The bulk of it came from the \$4,000 per day fee each track is required to pay. The report showed that \$54,000,000 in round numbers was bet in the Pari-mutuel machines at those tracks at the spring and fall meetings.

More Trouble In The Amateur Ranks

Action by A. W. Covey Against St. Francis Rebel Hockey Team is Awaited With Interest.

Sydney, N. S., Jan. 11.—Action by A. W. Covey, president of the Maritime Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, against the rebel hockey team of St. Francis Xavier College, Antigonish, which defied his authority by playing the Glace Bay team, whose members are without amateur cards, Tuesday night, is being awaited with interest. The match was staged to raise funds for the college rink building, and special efforts were made by prominent friends of the institution, and even by the clergy, to secure President Covey's sanction. The game had started when a telegram was received from President Covey refusing his sanction and it went on.

Commenting on the situation, D. L. Dolan, sporting editor of the Sydney Record, says the governing board of amateur sport in the Maritimes has never before been so openly defied by a college or other team, and adds that if St. Francis Xavier is suspended the result will be the disruption of the eastern section of the inter-collegiate league, and a rumour which may lead in the early demise of the Maritime Branch of the A.A.U. of Canada.

Carpentier Fights Cook In London

Unless Georges Wins Inside of Six Rounds Tonight It Will Be Virtual Defeat for Frenchman.

Paris, Jan. 11.—The French press generally expresses regret that Georges Carpentier has agreed to meet George Cook, the Australian, in a boxing contest in London tomorrow evening. The newspapers are showing little interest in the fight beyond pointing out that it will be a possible means of ascertaining whether his beating last summer by Jack Dempsey has slowed up the Frenchman.

Carpentier is the favorite in the betting by five or six to one. There is practically no Cook money, except a few small bets, even money, that the Australian will last six rounds.

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China Negotiating For Loans From Bankers In United States

Wants \$50,000,000 and Plans to Float Therefor Chinese Bonds.

Peking, Jan. 10.—Negotiations for a \$50,000,000 loan to China has been transferred from Peking to Washington and New York. There is excellent reason to believe favorable recommendation accompanied the transfer. The sum mentioned means Chinese currency which roughly is equivalent to \$50,000,000 gold.

Liang Shi Yi's financial strength and ability has increased the strength of the new cabinet sufficiently, it is believed, to secure the loan and make possible the sale of Chinese bonds in the American market, although the Chinese market will absorb part of the issue.

Pelt Auction Sale Reveals Fur Prices On Upward Trend

Bidding Keen Between Canadian and United States Buyers in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Jan. 10.—The prices realized for the fifty thousand pelts auctioned here today indicated that fur prices are on an upward trend. There was a strong demand for all classes, and bidding was keen between Canadian and United States buyers. Prices ranged as follows:—

Muskrat 96 cents to \$1.55; mink, \$4.00 to \$13.25; weasel, 68 cents to \$1.20; wolf, \$1 to \$1.14; martens \$2.30 to \$2.45; cross fox \$3.50 to \$4.7; beaver, \$16 to \$31; silver fox \$40 to \$190; bear, \$5.50 to \$13.50; red fox \$7 to \$12.25; other \$22.75 to \$45; lynx, \$20 to \$30 and Fisher, \$67 to \$153.

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
