## AMYOT, Lieut.-Col. GUILLAUME. (Bellechasse.)

Belongs to one of the oldest French families in Can., descending directly from Philip Amyot, who, with his wife, Ann Convent, came to Can. from Chartres, France, in 1635. S. of the late Guillaume Amvot, by Louise, dau. of the late Major Jean Gosselin. B. at St. Gervais, Co. of Bellechasse, 9 Dec., 1843 Ed. at the Coll. of Ste. Anne de la Pocatière. M, at Quebec, 27 April, 1874, Marguerite Alice Gertrude, dau. of Arthur Pennée, Esq., of London, Eng., formerly solicitor of the Supreme Court, India, and of Georgiana Mary Ward, of Northwood Park, Isle of Wight, Eng. She d. Dec. 1883. Called to the Bar, P.Q., Sept. 1867. Is a mem. of the law firm of Amyot & Pelletier, advocates, Quebec, and has represented the Crown at the Court of Queen's Bench, Criminal side. Was editor of L'Organe de la Milice and of Le Courrier du Canada. Is Lieut.-Col. commanding the 9th Batt. Voltigeurs de Québec, to which corps he has belonged since 1863, and commanded in the North-West Rebellion. An unsuccessful candidate for Lotbinière in the Leg. Assem., P.Q., at g.e., 1875 and 1878. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat in the Commons at g.e, 1878. Protested the election, got it voided and his opponent disqualified. First returned to Parlt., March 1881, and re-elected at g.e. 1882 and 1887. A National Conservative.—2 Collins St., Quebec.
