


SCENES FROM ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL REVUE

PUBLIC RELATIONS BOARD SET UP TO PUBLICIZE CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

A temporary office of public relations has been established on the campus by the Students' Council. One of the main functions of this new office will be to properly advertise and publicize student activities to the general public. However, public relations covers a far broader field than this, although at the present time it is the intention to publicize student activities.

If the general plan proves feasible it is probable that all publicity and advertising of practically all student functions will be the responsibility of the office of public relations in the future.

By this centralization it would be possible to handle advertising and publicity more effectively than could a number of individuals under the present set-up. Not only would the centralization prove efficient and effective but there is also the possibility of greatly reduced expenditures on advertising by the S.R.C. with far greater gate receipts at various student programs and sports games.

Moreover, the amount of goodwill which would be attained through closer liaison with the general public, would be adequate reason for the promotion and maintenance of the public relations office.

I have outlined the general purpose of this office which has been set up. Although it has not yet proved itself, sufficient support from a number of students could prove that the office would certainly be invaluable to the student body.

For those students who feel that such an office should be maintained on the campus we ask you to support it.

At the present time there is need, for a staff to handle the duties. The following are required: typists, reporters,—both sports and news; three department heads—one for sport, one for news, and one for radio.

Individuals who are interested in this type of work—no doubt it will prove helpful in your future occupation—should apply to the undersigned. It is pointed out that the remainder of the year will be used in experimenting and there will not be too much work involved. The main purpose is to establish a staff who will be interested in continuing and improving student relations with the press and radio, thereby informing the general public of student activity on the hillside campus.
