

## CO-EDS LOSE; FORCE PLAYOFF

Pat Barbour and Judy Cooney led the Mount Allison co-ed basketball team to a 46 to 43 defeat of the University of New Brunswick basketball team on Tuesday when the two teams tangled at the Sackville gymnasium. The win was a "must" for the Mt. A girls if they were to figure in the tie for first place. Dalhousie University defeated Acadia on the same night and the resulting three-way tie will be broken this Saturday. A round robin tournament will be played at the Beausejour gymnasium in Moncton to decide the championship for 1957-1958.

The "Bloomers" took an impressive lead in the first quarter of play as they outscored their opponents 16-8. Exhibiting fine team play and mastery of both ends of the court the UNB squad gave the Mt A team and fans some very anxious moments. Sheila Caughey, Biddy Wilson and 'Pune' McElman were outstanding on the defensive line

while Jo-Anne Carr was the centre of attention on the forward line with her grabbing of rebounds. The second quarter was UNB's downfall as the Mt A girls came to life to end the half 26-20. In this eight minutes of play the Mt. A team seemingly could do nothing wrong while UNB did nothing right. The last half of the game was a seesaw battle and although UNB led the scoring they never regained the control of the game which they had so ably built up for themselves in the opening minutes.

The "Bloomers" forward line of Smith, Colpitts and Carr accounted for all but four of their team's points as they netted 16, 12 and 11 points respectively.

UNB committed 23 fouls during the game and Mt A picked up 10 points as a result. UNB collected only three points on Mt. A's penalties. Dorothy May of Sussex and Roberta Johnson from Moncton were the officials.

The Saint FX team have won the Maritime crown for the past eleven seasons, defeating UNB in the last two years by

only two points over the two-game series.

The final this year will also be decided by a two-game, total-point series. The second tilt will be played in Antigonish next weekend. Referees for the game tomorrow night will be Bill Reid, a local whistle-tooter, and Tony Tamarro, an official who hails from the State of Maine.
