Assective limits on any policy that is to be applied immediately are created by the problem of providing ocean transportation and of establishing inspection facilities in cortain countries to which access is difficult at present. Moreover, Canada's policy has to be related to the social, political and economic circumstances resulting from the war. Among other considerations, it should take account of the urgent problem of the resettlement of persons who are displaced and homeless, as an aftermath of the world conflict.

Under existing circumstances, therefore, Canada's policy with respect to immigration falls, necessarily, into two parts:- measures designed for immediate application and a long-term programme.

immigration at the present time, there is confusion of two fundamental points; namely, the extent to which immigrants may legally enter Canada, and the extent to which they can physically get to Canada. At present, the limiting factor is not our legislation or regulations, but the shortege of transport. Through Canada's High Commissioner in London, the Government has kept in active touch with shipping authorities and transportation companies in the United
