Chabot and was piloted by one Felicien who is represented to be an inexperienced hand at managing the frail vessels in which the St. Lawrence is traversed, between Quebec and Pointe Levi during the winter season. This canoe left the usual starting place, on the Pointe Levi shore, yesterday morning, but had not proceeded more than a few miles when, in endeavouring to paddle past a large sheet of ice coming down with the tide, it was by some inattention jammed, and the whole of the passengers were precipitated into the water, and sixteen of them drowned. Among these unfortunate individuals were, Mr. Michel Roy, Tavern Keeper, Lower Town Market, his sister and two nephews; a Mr. Faucher, an Irishman and child, and three men who had the appearance of being sailors.—Among those saved was the Courier from Halifax with the mail, and the Courier from Nicolet with the mail which is forwarded along the north shore; both succeeded in saving the mail-bags. Another of the persons saved, described by the canoe-men as a "Bostonian" (an American) is lying in a dangerous state at the Hotel in Pointe Levi, having been severely injured by the ice. Beaulieu the conductor of the ill-fated vessel was also saved.

The Court of King's Bench, gave judgment on Monday last, on the motion made by Mr. Aylwin, on behalf of Teed, for a writ of habeas corpus. The motion was refused, the Hon. Chief Justice holding, that though the Act 31 Charles II. formed part of the criminal law of this Province, still that the proviso in the Act of the 1st Victoria did not prohibit the Special Council from suspending the Habeas Corpus Act. The Hon. Mr. Justice Bowen differed from the Hon. and learned Chief, in the opinion that the Act 31 Charles II. formed part of the Criminal Law of the Province; he on the contrary, held that it did not concur in opinion that the motion should be negatived.

The proceeds of the Bazaar in aid of the funds of the Female Orphan Asylum, we understand, amount to £335 15s.

The New Orleans Sun offers a reward of ten dollars for the ears of the editor of the Toronto Patriot.

The Yankees on the other side, who have recently made prize of a British Spy, assert that he is the chap who hanged Woodriff and other notables. Several persons, we hear, have embarked in taking out Elm, late in the season, tempted, no doubt, by the expectation of a high price, and the abundance of this sort of timber, but little of it having been cut formerly.—Bytown Gazette.
