ENGLAND.

The thousandth saniversary of the Russian Empire is to be celebrated pext year with great pomp.

Exciting debates have occurred in Parliament, on the Papal Aggression Bill, the second conding of which has been excited in the House, by a vote of 438 to 95. The minority consists of the Roman Catholic members, a few of the leading Liberals, and a section of the Peelites, Sir James Graham, Gladstone, Sydrey Herbert, and Mr. Cardwell, voted against the bill. The Whigs and Protectionists voted for the bill in nearly equal numbers. The bill will not go into committee until after Easter, and ill the Ministry meet with no contra-temps in the interval, the probability as, that it will pass the Lower House substantially as it was introduced in its ancended form by Lord John Russell.

In the House of Lords, on Friday evening, Lord Lyndhurst complained of certain refugees who are intriguing against Austria, and other Foreign States, and suggested the propriety of re-enacting the Alien Act. Earl Grey said the subject had received the attention of the Home and Foreign Secretaries, but they thought nothing short of danger to the internal peace of the country, would usuitly its re-enactment. In reply 16 the Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Grey said that the Government disapproved of the proceedings of the refugees.
