BULGARIA MAY BE TIED HAND AND FOOT NOW

Despatch Which is Significant of the Present Situation.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Paris, Sept. 29.—The Turco-Bulgarian treaty was ratified September 22, the representatives of Turkey attaching their signatures only upon receiving proof that a decree for the mobilization of the Bulgarian army really had been issued, the Matin asserts.

As a further precaution, Turkey stipulated that the Dedaghatz railroad should not be turned over to Bulgaria until Oct. 6, leaving fourteen days for Bulgarian mobilization.

The territory will not be ceded until October 11, so the Turkey and Germany may see what disposition is made of the Bulgarian army.

"Meanwhile," the Matin declares "the Germans are in command at Sofia as at Constantinople, and the Teutonic ministers resented to have expressed indignation because the strategic railroad to Lom-Palanka on the Danube, had not been completed."

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PREMIER BORDEN VISITS HAMILTON; GIVES ADDRESS

Guard of Honor, Consisting of Recent Recruits, Was Reviewed.

Hamilton, Sept. 29.—A reception befitting the first citizen of Canada was tendered Sir Robert L. Borden, Prime Minister, by the people of Hamilton last evening.

The streets through which the Premier's car was to pass were thronged, and when Sir Robert and Lady Borden arrived at the Hotel Royal, where the civic luncheon was given, another ovation was tendered them.

About 5,000 people assembled at the Armories long before the hour for the public meeting at which the Premier was to speak, and when in company with Mayor Walters he arrived he was acclaimed again and again.

The entire evening was but a testimonial that the citizens' irreflexive of political or other affiliations, appreciate in a splendid manner in which Sir Robert, and his colleagues have discharged the unprecedented onerous duties thrust upon them by reason of the European war.

The Prime Minister and Lady Borden reached Hamilton at 6.50 o'clock in their private car attached to the G. T. R. train. When they arrived at the Stuart Street depot, they were met by Mayor and Mrs. Walters, who escorted them to their waiting automobiles. On the station platform were also T. J. Stewart, M.P., P. C. Bruce, ex-M.P., the controllers, the aldermen, and a number of prominent citizens.

The guard of honor at the depot, composed of recent recruits to the Machine Gun Battalion, under command of Capt. Black and Washington and Webster, was received by distinguished visitors.

The men presented a very smart appearance. As the party passed to their motor cars the 13th Regiment band under the direction of Robinson struck up "O Canada," and then played other patriotic airs.

All along the line to Hotel Royal Chief Whately and a score of blue coats kept the streets cleared for the Premier's procession. Cheers after cheers greeted the Premier as he passed.

BOUQUET FOR LADY BORDEN. When the gentlemen of the party stopped at the hotel, Lady Borden and Mrs. Walters, accompanied by City Clerk Robert Bandister Robinson, the beautiful home of Mrs. P. D. Cramer, which had been transformed into a soldiers' home and where Lady Borden was presented with a bouquet by Mrs. Walters on behalf of the City Council.

The civic luncheon at the Royal was a purely informal affair, attended only by the Mayor, the controllers, the aldermen and a few specially invited guests, including A. F. Nolan, Vice Premier's secretary, Adam Brown, T. J. Stewart, M.P.; Allan Studholme, M.L.A.; Lieut.-Col. Anderson of Ottawa; Willoughby Ellis, chairman of the Hamilton Harbours and Fisheries Commission; J. C. H. Pattison of Grimsby. In passing through the Armories, the Premier inspected the second guard of honor as Sir Robert passed, gave three cheers for him.

At the public meeting Mayor Walters presided, and on the platform were also the controllers, aldermen and a number of representative citizens of all shades of politics, who came together to pay honor to Canada's chief executive. As the Premier rose to speak he was greeted with prolonged cheers. Sir Robert, after a few words of appreciation of the invitation extended to him by the Mayor and indicating the pleasure he felt at being able to come to Hamilton on this occasion, entered upon his remarks on the seat of war, in the western theatre. Sir Robert said he could safely say that the government of the various countries at war on the side of the allies, including Canada, were united in the determination to see the thing through to a successful and honorable issue. Sir Robert paid a striking tribute to the soldiers of Great Britain and France and told of his visit to the headquarters of Sir John French and General Joffre and of the magnificent spirit manifested by the officers and men of the two armies.

General Injured. Paris, Sept. 29.—General Cramer was seriously wounded at the battery camp, while watching experiments with explosives. He and his staff officers were hurled some distance when a mine was exploded accidentally. One of General Cramer's thighs was broken and he was badly burned while his companions suffered less serious injuries.

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CANADA'S BIG GUNS SHARE IN VICTORIES

Infantry Not in the Big Battle, But Kept the Enemy Busy.

Northern France, Sept. 29.—via London.—According to a Canadian officer I met yesterday the Canadians were not in the main fighting either southwest of Ypres or the La Bassee sector, but troops from the Dominion have had a strenuous three days with the Germans opposite them, "keeping them busy."

The Canadian heavy artillery was well employed in the Arras fighting, taking their full turn with imperial guns. The second division have had a real taste of the firing line and have seen some exciting warfare for their engineers have blown several saps in front of trenches now held by the Canadians.

AN OFFICER'S STORY. A Dominion officer with whom I talked, who had exceptional opportunities of seeing some of the bombardment in the Arras victory, tells me that for nearly two days it was "like hell let loose." British guns had the German works splendidly ranged and reports that came in before he left the front were that British losses were comparatively light, and that first line trenches of the enemy were taken almost by surprise so dazed were the defenders.
