MAKE SURVEY OF FISH RESOURCES

ario Government to
 Take Action in the
 Near Future.

Toronto, June 28.—A survey of the fish resources of every section of the province is to be undertaken by the Ontario Fish and Game Department as a preliminary to the institution of a policy of restocking inland waters with game fish.

At the present time, while the fish resources of the Great Lakes are comparatively well known, the department has little definite information as to conditions in the inland lakes, rivers and streams, with the exception possibly of some of the well known tourist districts. The scheme now being put into effect is to furnish every fish over-seer with a detailed map of his district with instructions to return it to the department with data showing the variety and quantity of fish in every river, stream and lake, together with all general information available.

With these maps and reports on file the department will be able to "take stock" and to decide upon the streams which can be restocked with advantage when the game fish hatchery plans now under consideration are put into effect.

STRATFORD WILL VALID.

Appel Court Decides Regarding Estate of Late John Lloyd.

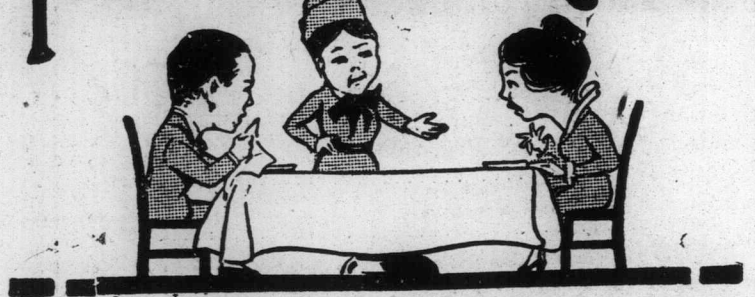
Toronto, June 28.—The family feud over the division of the estate of the late John Lloyd, grocer of Stratford, who died in May, 1915, leaving an estate valued at \$7,000, which he disposed of by will, has been finally adjusted by the judgment of the Appellate Court delivered at Osgoode Hall yesterday, sustaining the validity of the will. Under this document the estate was bequeathed to the family of the deceased as follows: \$1,000 to his son, Frank, and \$500 each to the latter's wife and son, \$3,000 to his son, Albert, and \$1,000 each to the latter's wife and daughter, the residue to go to Albert. Frank, who had resided with an uncle since nine years of age, was not satisfied, and attacked the will, alleging that his father was of unsound mind, and that Albert had exercised undue influence. When the suit was heard Chief Justice R. M. Meredith ordered the will to be set aside as invalid. This decision was appealed against, and the Appellate Court reversed the finding, Justice Garrow, who wrote the judgment, was absolutely no justification for Frank's allegation that undue influence had been used or that his father had been locked up in a dirty, ill-kept room and shut away from the world like a hermit. The testator's comments when giving instructions for the drawing of his will were those of a thoughtful, experienced man. In those comments the testator had made reference to the trouble Frank had caused over his mother's will, and he was anxious his will should be so drawn that there should be no grounds upon which it could be attacked.

RESTRICTING IMMIGRATION.

Austrian Paper Accuses Uncle Sam of Imperialistic Tendencies.

PRESIDENT MUST FIGHT

Jingoes in the States Require War Against Mexico.

 Vienna, June 27.—Via London, June 28.—The Tageblatt, the first Austrian newspaper to comment on the Mexican situation, expresses the opinion that the United States is committed irrevocably to an imperialistic policy which aims at the annexation not only of Mexico, but of all Central America. It regards the present situation as merely the logical outcome of the imperialistic policy which it says was begun under the Cleveland administration and to which the United States became wedded by the Spanish-American war.

U. S. Fomented Trouble.

The Tageblatt suggests that the unrest in Mexico since the Diaz regime has been fomented secretly by American money in order to create a situation which appears to warrant interference, ostensibly in the interest of peace. To whatever causes the succession of revolutions may be ascribable, says the Tageblatt, the American policy in any event is little short of "a bouquet of poisoned flowers," for President Wilson, at this time lashed to him, just at the moment desired to begin his campaign. The newspaper gives the President credit for desiring to maintain peace, but believes that if he should give to Mexico in the slightest degree, tantamount to American imperialism, simply sweep him out of sight.

The whole situation, The Tageblatt continues, may mean the inauguration of doctrine to parallel the Monroe doctrine, namely: "Latin-America for Latin-Americans."

LAKE STEAMER IS SUNK IN COLLISION

The Panther of Duluth Lost in Whitefish Bay.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., June 28.—The steamer James J. Hill of the Pittsburg Steamship Company of Cleveland, arrived here yesterday with the crew of the steamer Panther, owned by the Massey Steamship Company of Duluth. The Hill collided with the Panther in a dense fog Monday night off Persian Island in Whitefish Bay. The latter steamer sank.

St. Thomas, June 28.—Pulled from the wagon when his horse ran away yesterday, Alfred Nunn, 67, market gardener, residing at the corner of Hammond St. and Woodworth Ave., was fatally injured and died yesterday afternoon at the Amasa Wood Hospital.
