In yesterday's issue of this paper was published exclusively the final results of the presidential election, returns having been received from all states excepting Kentucky. McKinley's majority in the electoral college, not counting the vote of Kentucky, is 169, and his popular plurality amounts to 845,011, the largest ever given to any presidential candidate. The vote given to Grant most nearly approached the number which McKinley has received, the former having a plurality of 727,630.


