GEO. W. SEXTON IS GLAD HE CAME TO MANITOBA

Under above heading, the Winnipeg Tribune of July 31st, publishes the following:

A few years ago Geo. W. Sexton, now of Deloraine, came to Manitoba with just enough in his pocket for a few square meals. Today he goes over the \$250,000 mark. He has not made it all out of farming, but his farming operations have netted him handsomely from year to year. He received a cheque to day from the Lake of the Woods Milling Co. for \$14,900, payment for part of his wheat crop of last season. This season he has 2,100 acres of wheat in crop, and he says it is the finest he ever grew in the country. Barring accident it will be the heaviest and best wheat that he has yet harvested in Manitoba.

OGDENSBURG FAIR

The Ogdensburg Fair is always liberally patronized by the people of this district and the following opening announcement will be read with interest.

The Ogdensburg Fair and Horse Show will open on September 22, and continue until the 26th. On the opening day there will be several sensational flights with a Baldwin flying machine. Captain Paoli will be the Aeronaut and he has a reputation of being the most daring of bird men. In order to assure a flight he brings with him a flying machine, one of them a passenger machine which will afford any person, desiring to do so, an opportunity to view the surrounding country from an altitude of several thousand feet. At a considerable expense the management has secured Staines Comic Circus which will give four free attractions daily in front of the grand stand. Captain Sorcho has been engaged with his great Deep Sea Divers, for the entire period of the fair and appears for the first time in New York State in his wonderful act. The Midway this year will be the most attractive that has ever been gotten together at any fair in Northern New York, and indeed will equal the attractions that are offered by the large fairs in the vicinity of New York and Boston.

A NEW UNIVERSITY

Kings' on, Aug. 7.—At the convention of the Holiness Movement church in Canada here, it was decided to apply for a charter for the establishment of a university to be located at Ottawa.

The church has a school and a publishing house in Ottawa, and two pieces of property valued at \$130,000 and this will be sold to raise funds for men and women.

The properties which are owned by the Ottawa branch of the Holiness Movement include the old MacLean homestead at the corner of Centre and Bank streets, the Book and Publishing House at the corner of Flora and Bank streets and two churches, one on Fifth Avenue and the other on Bronson Avenue. A third church which is not in the city limits is situated at Billing's Bridge, this also is owned by the Holiness Movement.

The first two properties mentioned are very valuable.

The McLean property, after the death of Mr. McLean was purchased by Ex Mayor Hopewell, it is understood, for \$7,000. He sold it to the Holiness Movement for \$15,000, and since that time the valuation has each year been placed at a considerably higher figure.

A FATAL FIRE

A glow in the eastern sky on Friday evening attracted attention in Athens and a telephone message stated that the Eastern Hospital was burning. It was not so serious as that, but the loss of a life resulted. At the Hospital, two men noticed flames in the rear of the house. They immediately investigated and found that Miss Margaret Sullivan, aged 43, a trusted patient, who had been engaged on the farm, had set fire to her clothing. Mr. Collier and Mr. Malone at once set about to extinguish the flames with blankets, and in this they succeeded, but not before Miss Sullivan had received terrible burns. She was removed to the house and physicians from the town summoned, also Dr. J. C. Mitchell and Dr. F. S. Vrooman, superintendent and assistant superintendent respectively from the Eastern Hospital. Everything possible was done to save the life of the unfortunate woman, but she expired shortly after.

Miss Sullivan had simply lighted a match and touched it to her clothing. The flames got into the grass and it being very dry spread with great rapidity, owing to a stiff southwesterly breeze, to a large frame barn a few rods distant. Ten horses and two head of cattle were in the building and with great difficulty they were taken out in safety. The building contained a quantity of this year's hay, and being far beyond the fire limits there was no chance of saving it.
