The action recommended will be milder than Germany's original proposal, and it is expected that all the powers will accept it

The Cologne Gazette, in a semi-official statement, apparently intended for consumption in England and the United States, pointed out the serious position resulting from Prince Tuan's ascendency, "the continued massacre of missionaries and converts and other indications that the anti-foreign movement is directed verts and other indications that the anti-foreign movement is directed from an influential centre." It thinks that the situation thus created "must appear intolerable, even to those powers favoring a policy of indulgence and forbearance."

fied Reformer," as to my action in the council and as a signer of that petition against the paving of King street. I accept your apology and also accept your invitation granting me the use of the columns of your paper and just here let me thank you for the very fair way that you have assumed towards me thus far in my campaign, with the one exception above referred to.

In reference to the resolution passed by the council asking the Government to so amend the local frontage tax law so that it would permit any council to assess or tax part of the cost (not the whole) of the construction of permanent pavenments on leading thorough-fares into cities and town to the general fund. Both Mr. T. A. Smith and myself voted together in favor of this resolution so that in that respect, we, in the eyes of the ratepayers of Chatham, are "tarred with the same stick."

Now to convince that "Dissatisfied Reformer" or any other resident of Chatham and vicinity that my course in the council in reference to the paving of King St. has been a far-seeing and correct one and that the interest I took in the petition signed by myself and others dated Feb. 20th objecting to the pavement of King street at that time. I refer you to your readers to my opinion, as expressed to your reporter and published by you in your issue of March 3rd, which I am proud to say has been followed almost to the letter by the city council and generally approved by the ratepayers of Chatham. The article I refer to was published in your issue of March 3rd of this year. Some time after I had signed the petition and long before I had the slighest idea of becoming the Liberal Reform candidate for the county of Kent and is headed "What the People say About the King Street Paving Question." The opinion reads as follows:

"Alderman Geo: Stephens — I am prepared to pave King St., but before this is done I want to see all the water pipes, gas pipes and drains put in. I firmly believe that the King street pavement would be in good condition to-day were it not for the fact
