Heat and Bacteria.


Erroneous ideas are often entertained concerning the efficiency of heat in destroying bacteria, the importance of time in the operation being overlooked. Recent experiments reported at the Aberdeen congress on public health showed that a temperature of 140 degrees F. applied to nonvirulent tubercle bacilli produced by laboratory culture killed the germs if continued for ten minutes. A temperature of 140 degrees applied for a quarter of an hour killed the bacteria in tubercular sputum in five cases out of six. "Tuberculous milk heated to the same temperature for twenty minutes lost its power of infection.

REDMOND AND PARNELL

rmer Modelled Upon Latter Has Yet Former Remarkable Chief.

Those who have sought to trace a John Redmond and Mr. Parnell have surely insisted overmuch on the side of their characters, says The London Outlook. opportunities of carefully observing "the Uncrowned King's" House of Commons career failed to discover in im a single one of those attributes which by common consent are assigned to Irishmen, either on or off the stage. This is not so in the case of Mr. Redmond. Mr. Parnell, admittedly, was a consummate master at strategy, a man of unflinching will, and one who kept his unruly pack in order by the sheer force, as it seemed, of a superior mind dominating an inferior. He may have been respected, unquestionably he was feared, but no one can make even a pretense of saying that he was His was the Anglo-Saxon nature in its iciest and least alluring form; and in him there was also considerable dash of the mystic. Mr. Redmond is not a conscious plagiar ist; but it can hardly be doubted that he has modeled himself—largely, perhaps, by force of long association -upon that remarkable man, his former chief. At the same time, and looking a little below the surface, there are sharp points of contrast between the two. Mr. Redmond, though an Anglicized Irishman, re-

mains an Irishman still; Mr. Parnell never was an Irishman at all, save in regard to his national aspira-Mr. Redmond's "mysticism," too, is rather the natural shield of a

cautious politician who has learnt reticence by long practice of game than an endowment of Nature. He has taught himself how to school and keep curbed the impulses of an essentially Irish temperament; and that he generally succeeds says much for his self-restraint. But when he does burst out-which is seldom you know that in scratching the Parliamentarian you have found the Milesian. Mr. Parnell, on the other hand, never generated aught white heat. In a late platform speech Mr. Redmond allowed himself a license which he studiously eschews when addressing the House. Company Flotations in Canada.

Joint stock companies requiring further capital from the public usually adopt one of two methods. The first and usual manner in this country is to offer an issue of stock for public subscription, simply trusting to the public to provide the necessary capital for the purpose intended, but without any certainty of success. This is the in Canada. usual method English practice is to have issue underwritten, or guaranteed, prior to flotation. The latter method has frequently been adopted in Canada in connection with two or three of the largest issues dur-The the past few years. ing great objection to the first method is that the investor may find his money locked up in a business without sufficient capital and on a much smaller scale than an-ticipated. The public may fail to put up the necessary capital, and failure is more than likely to follow. The objection to the second plan usually adopted is that the company is obliged to impair its capital by paying fifteen, or twenty per cent. to the underwriters who guarantee the issue. For example, in \$100,000 of preference stock offered to the public, and \$100,000 paid therefor by the public, pany may have only \$80,000 or \$85,000 of capital.




