AS HELPLESS AS A BABE LIQUOZONE FREE

IS A STRONG MAN WITH A CINDER

Novel Device, Which May Be Operated by the Afflicted Individual Himself, fo Removing Cinders and Other Foreign Matter From the Eye-Can Be Carried in the Pecket-A Simple Boon.

A strong man with a cinder in his A strong man with a cinder in his eye is as helpless as a babe. A tiny speck no bigger than a pin's head puts him most completely out of business, as it were. He cannot remove the source of his agony himself, and there are only a few persons possessed of a hand steady enough to permit themselves to work around such a sensitive organ as the eye. Yet for one having a steady eye. Yet for one having a steady hand and a little skill the removal hand and a little skill the removal of the tiny tormentor is a simple

matter.

The old fashioned way of doing this was to insert a flaxseed or the hardened eye of a crab into the eye, and in its passage around the ball it carried with it the offending object. Children and ignorant persons

While the stout bristle is said to be entirely sufficient for most purposes, it is de-signed to manufacture these little de-vices also of a thin wire, which will be magnetized, and thus it will facilitate the removal of the object if it happens to be a piece of steel or

other metal.

For convenient carriage in the pocket or hand bag this loop is placed in a case not unlike a bottle. The loop is part of the cork, and the latter forms the handle by which it is manipulated.
