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THE RUSSIANS RETREAT

Japs Dreve Them From Their Positions in Disorder.

Men Attacked All Along th Line and Made An Advance-Kurepatkin Whipped-Gen, Oku's Army Alone Captured 25 Guns, While the Enemy Was Repulsed With Heavy Slaugh

Field Headquarters of the Japanese Left Army, Oct. 12, 5 p.m., via Fusan, Oct. 14.—The left army made an advance last night and early this an advance last night and early this morning occupied a position close to a village and field occupied by the Russians. The Japanese attacked along the whole line, driving the Russians out of the positions which they retired to yesterday. At three o'clock this afternoon the Russians were retreating northward in disorder. The Japanese captured a complete Russian battery. The Japanese plete Russian battery. The Japaness are pursuing and shelling the retreating Russians, whose loss is probably large.

Russians Beaten. Tokio, Oct. 14.—It is yet too early to measure the results of the tremendous struggle which has been engaged for the past three days south of Mukden, but all reports reaching Tokio indicate that Gen. Kuropatkin has been decisively whipped and severely punished. The Russian commander was evidently caught while making his dispositions with his forces scattered, and he was beaten before he could recover.

Much depends on the ability and resolution of the Japanese in applying and following up their advantages. Kuropatkin may turn up on tages. Kuropatkin may turn up on favorable ground and succeed in beating back the Japanese onslaught, but the tide seems against him.

The Japanese yesterday began a desperate effort to turn the Russian right, and if this effort should be successful it will carry disaster to the Russian arms.

Port Arthur Soon to Fall.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.—General Stoessel's report of the condition of affairs at Port Arthur, received yesterday, shows that the garrison on Oct. 7 was in unimpaired spirits, making a heroic defence against a series of most bitter assaults in all the history of sieges. The closeness of the fighting and the deadly char-acter of attacks and counter-attacks are shown by the fact that both sides are using hand grenades, and that the Japanese, after a bloody capture of the important signal stat-ion hill, were unable to hold the position in the face of the fire from the fortress. The reckless ferocity of the assaults seem to make it cer-tain that Port Arthur can only be

held by an immense expenditure of ammunition.

Russians Fight On St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.—Desperate fighting and heavy, losses on both sides, with varying success for the sides, with varying success for the Russians—such is the summing up of the situation by General Kuropatkin in a telegram filed Oct. 13. There is no sign of the battle slackening. On the contrary, Gen. Kuropatkin telègraphs that he had ordered the army to resume the light with unabated vigor to-day. General Kuropatkin himself is in the thickest of the fighting, and General Sakharoff, his chief of staff, is personally directing reconnaisances. The conflict has been most desperate at the centre and on the west flank. The advance guards at these points had to be repeatedly

Contrary to Field Marshal Oyama's report, no indication is given in General Kuropatkin's telegram of an enveloping movement by General Oku, The only positions captured by force were at the centre, where the Russians were compelled to retire during the afternoon. There is no mention of the loss of guns. The War Office maintains that even if it is true, it is of no material consequence.
