## TO INVESTIGATE

Mysterious Circumstances Surround the Death of John Pigeon-An Inquest Ordered

A couple of weeks ago John Pidgoen, and Simon Thibodeau, Chatham township, went out duck shooting at Bear Creek with fatal 'results. Pidgeon was killed having received the charge from a shot gun full in the face. Particulars of the affair were very meagre. Thibodeau claimed that Pidgeon had been killed by the accidental discharge of his own gun. The gun, however, was missing. The Crown Attorney, H. D. Smith, thought that there were several things in connection with the shooting which were worth investigating. He also gave orders that Pidgeon's gun, which was missing, should be secured. The gun was found Saturday and the Crown Attorney at once ordered an inquest. There are several facts in connection with the affair which the neighbors desire cleared up and it is only fair to Pidgeon's companion on that day that the mystery should be probed.
