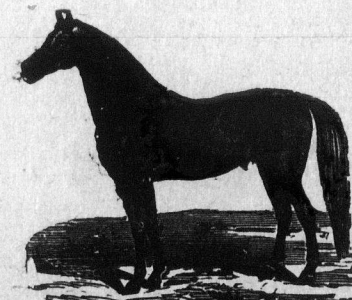

Sir,—Referring to a despatch from Chatham in the Globe of 9th inst. re submitting a by-law to vote on sugar industry and claiming that the plant from Warton was to be moved to your town, I beg to say that the reputed owners of the plant who live in Detroit have assured us that it will be operated here next season. Apart from this the town heavily bonused the industry, and one of the conditions of the by-law was that it should be operated here for ten years, which has been the town's gain, therefore giving the town a year, contested, and as it has only run two years, the town will oppose by any legal means within its power any attempt to remove the plant at the present time.

THAT LABOR QUESTION.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Sir,—The reply to my letter of the 10th, which A. Hard Workingman attempted in his two-thirds of a column of drivel last evening, is scarcely worthy of an answer, but, lest A. H. W., in his egotistical blindness, should take silent contempt for defeat, I crave your indulgence to trespass once more on your valuable space, for the use of which my esteemed contemporary has, up to the present, forgotten to thank you.

Your correspondent starts by calling me "a self-conscious and world-innocent Anglo-Saxon." To this I say, that although it is against my principles to use the first person in a letter of this nature, I was born of my life in England, and have travelled just three-quarters of the way around this little world of ours. From the extremely one-sided nature of my verdant friend's epistle, it is apparent that his travels have been confined to cheap excursions to Detroit and Wallaceburg.

As for the slanderous remarks and libellous insinuations which constitute the greater part of his "effort," they are too contemptible to merit the attention of a square man; although, as a side-track for a cornered braggart they may serve as a means of avoiding the real issue of an argument.

A. H. W. huris abuse at his opponents and blithers dreadfully about things he does not understand, but he has not yet advanced a single reason against the better treatment of the working classes which Pro Bono Publico I have advocated.

Personal abuse is not argument. It suggests, at once, a meanness of spirit and lack of sportsmanship on the part of its author. It is the weapon of the blackmailer, and is singularly out of place in the columns of the press.

For this, I think, he owes Canada and her people an humble apology. Since he continues to evade the issue and to hold himself up to ridicule, and since he is only degrading his worthy countrymen by his shallow outpourings of malice, it is plainly his duty to withdraw from the field in which he has suffered such ignominy and to allow an abler writer to take up the pen "to show us why the workmen of Canada should not receive better treatment than they are now getting." It is not likely that he will do so, but, at any rate, I have no desire to indulge in the childish quibble he has commenced.
