REMANDED FOR A WEEK MORE LONDON BRIBERY

Toronto, Oct. 23.—Thomas Lewis appeared before Magistrate Kingsford yesterday on the perjury charge.

T. C. Robinette, for the defence, got permission to ask for particulars, but waived the right, pleaded not guilky and asked for a jury trial. He did, however, register formal objection to the jurisdiction of the magistrate to try the case.

Crown Attorney Coriey asked to have the information amended so as to have the svidence of Oct. 4 added.

The portions of the evidence given in the investigation, upon which the charge of perjury was laid, were then submitted.

submitted.

The first was the evidence of Alfred J. Clark, and Mr. Robinette objected that perjury could not be proven in that case, as Clark and Lewis were alone at that time, and it was simply a case of oath against oath.

Mr. Robinette pointed out that the witness had afterwards corrected this evidence and the magistrate held that no perjury could be proven if the witness corrected his statements and told the correct version.

After the reading of Lewis' contradictory evidence, and his explanation that he was ill and his memory poor when testifying, the magistrate expressed the opinion that there was already sufficient evidence to commit for trial.

Before the proceedings opened yesterday afternoon, Mr. DuVernet told Magistrate Denison that, by an arrangement with the Attorney-General, the prisoner, Thomas Lewis, would be freed on this own bond of \$5,000 and two additional bonds of \$2,500 each. One of the bondsmen is R. M. Tooth, the London barrister, and John Lewis, a brother of the prisoner, will arrive this morning to furnish the other \$2,500 ball.
