THE NORMAL SCHOOL.

The proposed action of the Ontario Government, to establish three new Normal schools, is one which has been received all over the Province with words of the heartiest com mendation. The question of education is one of the most important of any now before the public, and it is receiving able treatment at the hands of Mr. Whitney and his col-

Chatham's claims for one of these new schools are many. As has been pointed out, there are at present no Government institutions situated in the Maple City, and, apart from that, there is no other place in Ontario so perfectly suited for an institution of this kind. Situated as it is in the very centre of the three counties-Essex, Kent and Lambton-from which it would draw the great majority of its students, it would be decidedly the mose convenient city for all wishing to attend a Normal school in the western portion of the province. We have, also, as has so often been remarked by educationists from all over the Dominion, the most up-to-date, finest equipped and best managed schools in Ontario. The public school teachers educated in these schools. and trained in our own Model school. are always in demand and stand high in the vast host of educational workers in the Province. Why should not a city, which has provided such facilities for school training, be recognized and rewarded?

The joint committee appointed to present the Maple City's claims be fore the Government, is working earnestly and faithfully. These gentlemen, who are among the most prominent and influential citizens of the community; deserve the highest praise for their prompt action in securing an audience with the Hon. the Minister of Education for Wednesday next. It now rests with them to put the case clearly and effectively before him, and knowing the gentlemen as we do, we are quite certain that this will be done.

Whatever the outcome may be and the prospects for success are very bright-the community will owe to the gentlemen on this committee a hearty, vote of thanks for the time and energy they are expending in the interests of our city.

PULPWOOD CONCESSION REFORM

Most important is the announce ment of the measures to be taken by the Ontario Government in relation to the pulpwood resources of the Crown Lands, says the Mail and Empire. This announcement was not unexpected. It changes into a reality the professions and the promises which Mr. Whitney tendered to the people when he was in Opposition. His Government is now dealing with the pulpwood assets of the province exactly as he urged the Ross Government to deal with them, exactly as he pledged himself to deal with

Hereafter pulpwood tracts will be disposed of in limits, that is, in defined parcels, as pine has long been disposed of. And at such times as it is deemed to be in the public interest to sell pulpwood limits, certain ones designated will be put up at auction after being duly advertised. If the Government's upset price is not realized, the limits will not sold. Thus the province will get whatever bonus the competition of bidders will bring or it will keep the timber. Of course, the tracts offered will be of such extent as appears to be requisite for the maintaining of a large mill in an adequate supply of raw material, but there will no longer be any areas granted on the magnificent scale of those conveyed by the Ross Governmen'. These, which spread over the country north of the C. P. R. main line as if they were great counties. are not in the interest of the pulp and paper industry of this province In the first place, their magnitude has a tendency to scare away other people who wish to establish pulp and paper mills in Northern Ontario. Against competitors in possession of such great resources of timber, manufacturers with modest capital might feel that they would have no chance. In the second place, the seeming advantage of the concessionsire under the Ross system is deceptive, as settlers are free to rush in and occupy the dand, clearing the pulpwood away as fast as they please. That is, the Ross type of concession deters competition and does not ensure an unfailing supply of material. Under the new arrangement these two defects will disappear. There will be no blanket limits, and the pulp and paper makers who pay for timber and go

to great expense to build mills and construct power works for the manufacture of such timber into product can rely upon getting what they centracted for.

Two new conditions have been adopted as supplementary reforms, conditions in the interest of the public as well as that of the limitholders. The better to perpetuate the supply of timber, the Government has raised the minimum measurement of trees eligible to be cut from the present diameter of six inches on the stump to one of eight inches. This provides for speedier and surer renewal of crop. Further, the fire-ranging service will be strengthened, and in every way made efficient for the protection of the limits. Five Ross agreements which were not carried out have been cancelled. Any disposition hereafter to be made of them will be subject to the new conditions laid down by the Government.
