Mr. A. P. Stephens was a Chatham visitor on Saturday.

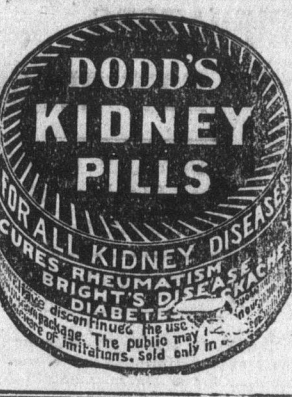
