The Skating Tournament.

Owing probably to other attractions and the frigidity of the atmosphere, the Sports at Aberdeen Rink on Saturday evening last were not largely attended.

A number were present from Kentville, and worked their lungs vigorously for the encouragement of their champion. Though not a large number of entries, the various events were well contested.

The feature of the evening was the exhibition of fancy skating by Mr D. R. Munro, who executed the various difficult and complex figures of his programme with grace and dexterity, and was at various intervals greeted with applause. Mr Munro probably has no equal in the Province as a fancy skater.

The one mile race between C. B. Newcombe, of Kentville, and Clinton Shaw, of this town, was won by the former. Claret met with an accident during the first half mile, which probably had something to do with his defeat.

The hurdle race was also won by Newcombe. This race created considerable amusement, a number of the contestants meeting with bad falls. Too many hurdles were knocked down for a good race.

In the potato race the Kentville man was again victorious, with Dimock a good second.

The barrel race was won by Dimock. In the blanket race Stanley Gillmore succeeded in getting under first, but owing to a disagreement it was run over again, when Ralph Shaw was the first to see daylight.

A scratch race was arranged between Ralph Shaw and a supposed skater from Kentville. This was "planned" for Ralph, his competitors being becoming impatiently tangled up before two laps had been finished, and who concluded that his chances of winning were as good in the dressing room as on the ice.

The local race brought out Ralph Shaw, Slijp and Fred Roberts. This was the best race of the evening. It was sharply contested from start to finish.

Slijp had the misfortune to meet with two falls, which destroyed his chances of winning, and the laurels fell to Ralph, who was given an enthusiastic bounce.

A hockey match was played between teams captained by Messrs Herb and Harry Johnson, which resulted in favor of the latter by a score of 5-3.

Mr C. M. Vaughn acted as starter. The "double grape vine" by Mr Munro was one of the prettiest feats on skates we have ever seen.

The extremely modest and unassuming manner with which the hero of the town took his victories, elicited the admiration of all. Mr Newcombe was one time a compositor in the office of the ACADIAN.
