grower was satisfied, and it was uniform with the American Grade No. 1. Now while this change was not made I wish to point out that if it had it would have destroyed the potato industry in New Brunswick as so much of the crop would have graded as Grade B that no market for them could be found and so make the growing of potatoes prohibitive.

Now Sir, I would like to point out that there is not a Province in Canada with the possible exception of P. E. I. that can compete with New Brunswick in raising a good quality of potatoes, and as the other provinces cannot raise Grade A potatoes it is very evident that they wanted to raise to a great extent that ours would be found and so make the growing of potatoes prohibitive.

I would like to call the attention of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture to the fact that while the amendment was not made we did not have a representative on that Council, but we were represented by a man from Nova Scotia, and I would like to suggest that in future we have a practical potato man to look after our interests in this important industry.
