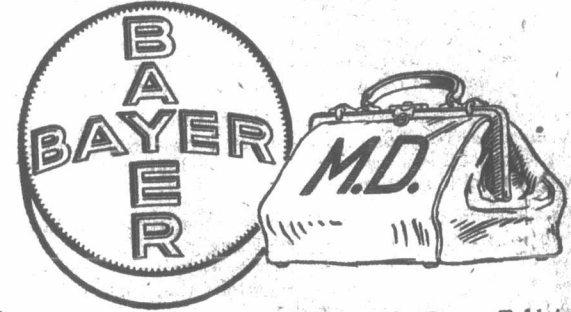

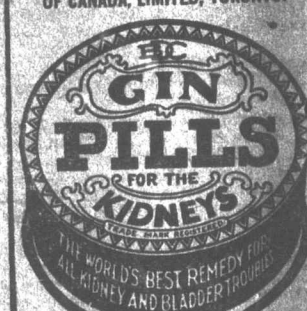

FATAL FIRE AT VAN BUREN

Five Lives are Lost When Boarding House Burned on Tuesday

One of the most shocking fires we have had in this north country visited Van Buren, Maine, on Tuesday morning about two o'clock. The scene of the fire was the boarding house situated close to the B. & A. railroad station and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Madore and their seven children, and a number of boarders.

The occupants of the house had no warning of fire until the whole interior of the building was a mass of flames, and it resulted in five people losing their lives.

The names of those who were the victims are as follows: Mrs. Delphis Boucard and her two children, aged four years and eighteen months respectively. Mrs. Boucard accompanied by her children were on their way to St. Quinlan for a visit, and only arrived at the boarding house the evening previous. Another one who was burned to death was a man named McCardie, who had been staying in the hotel for a few days. His name is not known, and THE OBSERVER was not able to find out his home address, as he was a particularly reticent man. His age is variously estimated at between thirty-five and forty-five. Mr. Madore, the proprietor, was badly burned and being trapped by the fire jumped from the second storey window, and died early Tuesday afternoon from the result of injuries and burns.

Names of the Injured Residents of Grand Falls

Two others injured in the fire were Paul Parent and Miss Mary Anne Rioux, who arrived there from a point on Monday night and who intended taking the train on Tuesday morning for their homes. They were removed to the Hammond House and given every attention and care. On Tuesday night a representative of THE OBSERVER was told that they were in no danger and were resting comfortably. The cause of the fire is a complete mystery, although the house was heated with stoves. The fire was confined to the interior of the house, and the walls are still standing. The fire did not spread to any other place. Much sympathy goes out to the relatives of the victims and everything possible was done to help in the tragedy which threw a gloom over the whole town. The damage is estimated roughly at \$700 and this is believed fully covered by insurance.
