WHY DON'T THE FARMERS BUY THEIR SHARE?

Victory Loan May Fail Because of Their Shirking—Villages Have Done Well, so Have Farmers of Peel and Wakefield

Little Harold is the brightest four-year-old in Hartland. He goes to Sunday school and last Sabbath his teacher explained to the tots God's ownership of the heavens and earth and all that in them is. To know if the children understood she asked Harold: "Now, who does this church belong to?" and like a flash came the significant answer: "The Farmer's, I s'pose; they've bought 'bout ever'ing 'round here."

Pastor Trites, who is canvasser for Victory Loan 1919 saw the humor of the child's remark but his face went quickly grave when he said: "No, they have not bought everything. They have still to buy their share of Victory Bonds!"

To date people of Brighton have bought \$47500 of Victory Bonds, less than one-half of their objective. Of this farmers of the parish have taken but \$2250—two farmers have bought a thousand each, and one has bought a fifty dollar bond. And yet the farmers hail themselves as the bone and sinew, and the power and strength of their country!

The Observer has given constant and earnest support to the organized farmers. It boomed their election candidate, it sincerely believed their aggression was worthy of encouragement. But what is revealed in the Victory Loan campaign? The shameful

disgraceful figures speak for themselves!

Is the allegation true that the farmers care nothing for any class but themselves—and nothing at all for their country?

Surely there is mistake and misunderstanding somewhere, for certain farming districts have done magnificently. In Wakefield west the farmers have gone gloriously over the top. In Peel most of the purchase has been by farmers. What is wrong elsewhere?

There are still three days to buy bonds. Let us hope the farmers will yet do their share toward re-establishing the value of the Canadian dollar.

WAR VETERANS' MEMORIAL SERVICE

Heroes of Brighton Parade to United Baptist Church on Sunday

On Sunday morning, in the crisp air and brilliant sun-shine, the members of the local branch of the G.W.V.A., to the number of 34 formed up, outside the Armory and marched to the United Baptist church, where they gave attention to a forceful sermon delivered especially for their benefit by the pastor, Rev. E. A. Trites. The subject of the able discourse was "Our Responsibility to Future Generations" and the text was found in 1 Peter, 1:12. The church was effectively decorated with the national colors, and the choir sang special selections in pleasing manner. The church was filled to overflowing, as other services in town were suspended in order that all might have opportunity to join in the soldiers' tribute to the memory of the ones who will never return. Before the pulpit was a scroll on which were emblazoned the names of the fallen heroes from Brighton and the immediate vicinity. Private S. G. Barter read the honor roll. The service throughout was solemn and touching.

Think Caldwell a Giant

T. W. Caldwell, the newly elected farmer representative from Carleton, arrived to-night and will take his seat some time this week, probably on Thursday. He is a fine looking man, a giant in size, as Simonds of P. E. Island, another farmer giant remarked when he was introduced to him, "You are not a bad size yourself," said the new member. In an interesting talk with your correspondent Mr. Caldwell gave some particulars of his campaign. He said he had no campaign fund, no cigars, no promises, nothing in the way of ordinary election munition, and he had informed his workers that if he found out that a vote had been bought he would resign. The election fund was made up on polling day by a collection in the crowd and will be audited and returns made.

"I am very anxious to meet Hon. Mr. Meighen," said Mr. Caldwell, "as I calculate he added about a thousand to my majority."

When Mr. Meighen was informed of this he had some difficulty in figuring it out, as he said that the two places where he had spoken the polls had been very favorable to the Government candidate. The explanation may be as given by Mr. Caldwell that the farmers resented the presence of the Cabinet members in the constituency. He estimates that he got about half of the soldier vote and the farmers were practically solid.

When he takes his seat it will be on the cross benches and he will shape his future course when he finds his bearings in the House, but will certainly be solid for the farmers who elected him. What his debating power is may also be revealed before the House adjourns, as he appears well able to take care of himself in any situation and is a good representative of the coming farmer element in the House.
