REFORM IN BETTING LAWS

Follow Disclosures in the Liverpool Bank Case.

Great Interest Taken in the

The Verdict Produces a Sensation Among Sporting Men.

London, Feb. 21.—The trial of Goudie's alleged accomplices in the Bank of Liverpool frauds is exciting more interest than anything going on in public or social life. It is an object lesson on the criminal tendencies of the prevailing mania for betting, more practical than any evidence obtained by the select committee of the House of Lords during somnolent sessions. Whoever was behind the bank clerk held a club over him through the menace of exposing the forgeries, and directly or indirectly forced him to enlarge his criminal operations. The fact induces many practical reformers to believe that the best method of preventing abuses and excesses in gambling on horse-racing will be to make betting a valid contract, which can be enforced by legal process only within a month, and to render it a criminal offence for book-makers or turf gamblers to attempt to obtain money after that period by threats of exposure or other-wise.

Whether the prosecution succeeds or whether the prosecution succeeds or fails in following up yesterday's conviction of Burge and completing the chain of circumstancial evidence against the two other prisoners remaining under indictment, the case has too direct a bearing upon the morals of bank clerks and men of moderate means trusted by their employers not to leave a permanent impression on to leave a permanent impression future legislation for lessening evils of turfgambling.

Burge's Evidence.

Richard Burge was a jaunty witness at the Old Bailey, and, under the judicious management of counsel, protected himself shrewdly against the charge of complicity with the bank forger. He passed the cross-examination fairly and commanded the admiration of sporting men for his agility in evading searching questions. The Judge's summing up bore heavily against him, and the jury convicted him promptly on evidence that he was handinglove with Marks, Mances and Goudie and received the bulk of the proceeds of the forgeries. The verdict has produced a great sensation among sporting men, and can hardly fail to promote reform in the morals of the turf.
