Mayor of London Was a Big Man In Bys-Gone Days.

At a grand entertainment given in the fifteenth century by the sergeants-at-law at Ely place, Holborn, the lord treasurer, Baron Ruthwen, refused to recognize that as the sovereign's immediate representative the lord mayor was bound to take precedence of every other subject within the limits of the city. The hold bad baron sat stolidly, therefore, at table in "the most honorable place," whereupon the lord mayor, instantly withdrew, followed by his faithful aldermen and sheriffs and all the other citizens.

The person of the lord mayor was once held to be sacred and inviolable, and none dare approach his presence in an impudent manner. Men have been hanged for forcible resistance to his authority, and it is on record that one Richard Bayfield, in the year 1479, was fined £50 for presuming to kneel too close to his lordship at St. Erkenwald's shrine. More awe-inspiring still, the lord mayor once commanded the services of a merry-andrew and a poet laureate, whose wit and verse, had they existed now, would have been employed in the show which a month hence is to body forth seven centuries of the city's civic life.

Ben must have performed his duties not too graciously, for we know that he wrote a letter complaining of the corporation withdrawing him from their "chandlery pension for verjuice and mustard." Upon which letter a champion of the city made the comment that the pension was "not so chandlery, for it amounted to £33 6s. 8d., a sum which may at least stand comparison with what has been at any time allowed other laurestes of higher degree." It was much more than was allowed even to the king's laureste in Ben Jonson's days, for, till 1630, the pension was but 100 marks—without a sip of canary.

Now that the British Parliament has reassembled, a new crop of aneodotes of Mr. Balfour has been harwested by M.A.P., some of which are interesting. Raising his hat to a group of ladies while cycling on his estate, Mr. Balfour managed to fall into a flowerbed. "You did that very gracefully," said a friend. Mr. Balfour, who was a pretty wit, replied: "I always dismount in the presence of ladies." Reverting to the days of his Irish Secretaryship, Mr. Balfour asked Father Healy, "Do the Irish really hate me as much as their newspapers say?" "My dear sir," replied the grim old wft. "if they only hated the devil half as much as they hate you my occupation would be gone." All his Irish experiences were not se bitter. The perils of India.

The perils of living in a country where wild beasts and snakes—especially snakes—are numerous, are strikingly shown in a statistical abstract on India. During the year 1904 no fewer than 24,034 persons were killed, snake bites accounting for 21,880 deaths; while tigers killed 796, leopards 399, wolves 244, and other animals 728 persons. The administration of Bengal supplied the highest figures in each class. The number of cattle killed was 98,582, leopards, with 42,812 to their credit, proving the most destructive. The tigers were a good second with 24,037 victims. Snakes killed just over 10,000 animals. On the other side of the account it is reported that 65,146 snakes and 16,121 wild animals were killed, rewards being paid to the amount of £7,313. Perils of India.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of

160 acres more or less. Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Subagency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by roxy may, however, be made at an Agen cy on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans: (1). At least six months' res-

derce upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2). A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required

residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement. (3). If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a

homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80), acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties living with the father (or) moth-

(4). The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances cros-

sed in the neasurement.
(5). A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
