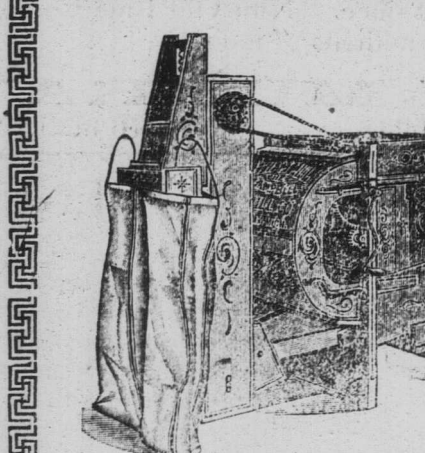

ROOSEVELT IS PITCHING TAFT.

It is Said He is Booming Cortelyou for the Presidency.

(Special to the Morning Graphic.) NEW YORK, Thursday.—A Washington dispatch to the New York Globe tonight says:

"A sensation was caused in political circles today by the assertion from a certain quarter to the effect that Archibald Ireland of St. Paul had been at work in the Northwest for a month or more organizing such strength in and out of the church as he can command for George B. Cortelyou for President. In doing so, it is declared he had the backing of President Roosevelt. The story has caused politicians here to sit up and anxiously inquire whether the President has thrown Taft overboard and has determined to test the secretary of the treasury as presidential timber.

TAFT'S PEACE SPEECH MAKES JAPS FRIENDS.

The Little Jap will now Have a Different Opinion of Americans.

TOKYO, Thursday.—Secretary of War Taft has voiced Washington's attitude toward Tokyo, United States of Teikok's feeling toward the imperial Japanese government. What the effect will be remains to be seen.

Whether or not the Japanese can bring themselves, without due effort, to accept the speech at its face value, need not be discussed in extenuate here. But they will not quibble over Mr. Taft's sincerity. His frankness in discussing the possibility of war electrified the audience and the country.

It must be understood that no representative of the United States government, upon whom might have developed the duty of so frankly discussing with Japan and the United States as combatants, would have received a more respectful hearing than Mr. Taft. Neither is there any of his colleagues in whose integrity of purpose, depth of feeling, honesty, will and ability to deliver the truth as he sees and feels it do the Japanese people feel as great confidence as they do in Mr. Taft. Had Mr. Taft been delegated by Mr. Roosevelt to convey to the Japanese government and people the message that he communicated to the empire and the world last night at the dinner spread in his honor by the municipality and the Chamber of Commerce of Tokyo, he could not have performed this delicate task more successfully, or to the greater satisfaction of those who heard him.

Of course, every one, from government ministers down to the humblest reader of the daily press, regards what Mr. Taft said as an official deliverance.

Mr. Taft invested the speech with circumstance. He read it slowly and with frequent liftings of his eyes to those of the Japanese notables seated in front of him. Through the entire speech ran a broad based trail of American spirit and fearlessness. It was entirely a dignified deliverance.

Reading Pleased Them.

"They like it that he read, instead of speaking without the copy," was the reply. "That was very good."

THIRD PARLIMENT OF RUSSIA OPENS.

Social Democrats Remain in Committee Room During Reading of Emposer's Speech.

ST. PETERSBURG, Thursday.—The third Russian parliament was opened in the Tauride palace at 11 o'clock this morning in the presence of Premier Stolypin and the cabinet by M. Golebuev, vice president of the council of the empire. The religious service preceding the opening was conducted by the metropolitan antonus and a large number of bishops and other high ecclesiastics and was made the occasion for a great display of patriotic enthusiasm on the part of the conservative and moderate members. The national hymn was repeatedly sung and the emperor was vigorously cheered. The city is quiet. A few

hundred students gathered in the vicinity of the palace but they did not attempt to make a demonstration. The only discordant note was struck by the social democrats who remained in the committee room during the reading of the emperor's greeting and endeavored to sing the national hymn or in the cheering but otherwise they participated decorously in the proceedings. M. Klotynskoff was elected president of the house receiving 371 votes on the first ballot.

THIS BRIDE IS SEVENTY, GROOM IS SEVENTY FIVE.

LOWELL, Thursday.—News of the marriage on Saturday last of Henry C. Wilder, 75 years old, and Mrs. Esther Crawford, who is but five years his junior, became current today, when the couple returned from a short honeymoon trip and sent out cards telling their friends and acquaintances that they would be at home at their new home at 102 Parker avenue. Only a few of their most intimate friends had been let in on the secret previously and as a consequence the announcement today caused general surprise.

Wilder, who was a widower, and his new wife, herself a widow, had been neighbors for many years, but nobody suspected that more than a neighborly regard existed between the two. Saturday Wilder secured a marriage license and the couple went to the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church, of which Mr. Wilder is a deacon, and were married by the Rev. Forrester A. Macdonald.

BRISTOL, Eng. Thursday.—The Premier Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman after addressing a political meeting was seized with a sudden illness last night at the residence here of William Howell Davis, liberal member of parliament for South Bristol. Doctors attended the sufferer for over an hour and although the sharpness of the attack has ceased the Premier's condition is such that London doctors have been summoned. Heart trouble is believed to be the cause of the illness. Sir Henry planned to make several political speeches but he has given up his engagements and requested the chief secretary for Ireland Murrell to take them over. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman prime minister and first lord of the treasury since 1905 was born in 1836. At one time during the night the Premier's condition created the gravest alarm. Mr. Murrell who also is at Bristol was summoned to see his chief. Oxygen was administered and relief was obtained. Later it was announced that the Premier's sudden illness was due to a severe spasm of the heart which gradually was relieved by restoratives. He was progressing favorably this afternoon.
