

Latin America, including under this convenient term Mexico and Cantral and South America, where Spanish and Portugueres are spoken, has over 4,500 newspapers of all sorts, 200 of which are printed in other languages than Spanish or Portugueses, almost every foroign tongue bang represented. The mespapers of the British Isles num-ber 2,272, London alone sending out 496 of the set. The monthly magazines and reviews of all kinds published in the British Isles total up an additional 1,900. Parls has 12 more dailles than London, New York, Poiladelphis and Boston com-bined. The Parisian papers, of which there are 141 altogether, are generally dis-tionished by having larger circulations than these of all other cities. 

The oldest European newspaper stil published is the Post Zeitung, of Frank-fort, which dates from 1616. This can boast of the most ancient newspaper in the Pekin Gazette, which made its first appearance in A. D. 911. It otherwise makes a poor showing in the journalistic world. For all its 400,000,000 of which are daily and 14 appear as longer intervise. Only 11 are printed in Chinese, 1 is printed in French, the rest being in English. Japan presents a striking contrast, having 92 dailies and 75 other periodicals. Nearer home, even the little island of Iceland, with some 70,000 inhabitants, has the same number of newspapers as the great empire of Crina. The newspapers of India are published in many languages, and it is said that those in the native tongues are more widely civalated and read, in proportion to the number of copies printed, than is the care anywhere else in the world. A single copy will serve a whole village, and will pase from hand to hand until it actually falls to printe. Peria has eix newspapers, all in the





THE SMALLEST PAPER. Borneo has the smallest regularly pub-lished newspaper in the world-the Sarawak Gozette, printed in English, and first issued in 1807. All over the world some 50 languages are represented by the newspapers. Many are printed in two or three languages. Euglish in such cases being usually one. The newspapers of Austria show a greater variety in this repect than those of any country, including in the list German, Italian, French, Magyar or Hungerlan, Greek, Latin, Polish, Servian, Siav.c and Hebrew. Hebrew.

Hebrew. The most remarkable paper is in Anta, and probably in the world as regards lan-guage is the Acta Comparationis Literarum Universitatum, a semi-monthip review of comparative literature, which has contribu-tors in every next of the world where tors in every part of the world, whose articles are all printed in their native la South America there are papers pub-

The South America there are papers pub-liabed in various native language, notably in the Guarani of Paraguay. The Zalua, even, had some years ago a paper in their own dialect published in South Africa, but it has now ceased to appear.

A GREAT NAME.

The lengest newspaper title in existence is that of a Greenland sheet, which rejoices in the euphonious designation of Arrang-agliotio Natinginnavnik Susaremmas Sivik.

Sivik. Curious, also, is the conjurction of names which obtains in Tombstone, Ari. The leading newspaper is the *Bpitaph*, which is edited by an Englishman named Coffin and published by a man named Sexton. The publisher declines advertisements of undertakers, but appropriately inserts death notices gratis.

notices gratis. The most portbern paper is the Nordslap, published at Hammerstelp. The editor and his staff work in a small tuff-roofed wooden house. News comes by mail boat, and the Hammerstelaers are made aware of the Hammersteiners are made aware of the world a events generally eight days late, and, as the paper is a weekly, its news is often a fortnight old. The subscribers are kept still further behind, as many of them have their copies delivered by boats unless they fetch them, which they sometimes do, psying for them in herrings and other fish.




