How They Defend It Against Leaf Destroying Insects.

A standing army of ants for defensive purposes is kept and provided with food by a sensitive plant of Nicaragua. In this acacia there are two large thorns at the base of each leaf inhabited by colonies of ants which bore into the thorns and make a home for themselves by eating out the soft inner tissue. On the leaf stalks there are honey glands, and at the tip of each leaflet there is a sausage shaped body, about as large as a pin's head, consisting of albuminous food. The ants sip the nectar and eat the food bodies, and being contented with their lot, remain on the plant without doing it any injury.

with their lot, remain on the pant without doing it any injury.

Whea the plant is threatened by an
invasion of leaf cutting ants, which
would damage it, the ants composing
the plant's army or police force rush out
and repel the intruders. Many similar arrangements exist in tropical plants, In one of the most remarkable of these ant plants the female ant bits a these ant plants the female ant bits a hole in the stem and brings up her brood inside it. The stalk of each leaf is swollen at its base and bears food bodies which are eaten by the ants when they emerge to find for themselves. As the old food bodies are eaten new ones are formed, thus keeping the ants, which are of a fierce disposition in the plant's employment. Plants of the same species which do not happen to be inhabited by ants fall an easy prey to leaf cutting kinds of ants, which are only too plentiful in the tropies. In other cases the defensive ants are provided only with shelter in cavities of the stem, and various naturalists have observed that these ants pour out in troops whenever leaf cutting enemies

have observed that these ants pour out in troops whenever leaf cutting enemies attempt to attack the foliage.

The ants which thus defend these plants are small, but sting with extreme virulence, their small size making them the more formidable. The leaf cutting ants cut off the leaves and pile them up in heaps, forming a sort of kitchen garden of leaf mould, upon which they cultivate a fungus belonging to the mushroom family. They sow the sphores of the mushroom and make a pure culture of the fungus, nibbling at it to prevent the development of mushroom heads and thus promote the growth of spawn.—Chicago Tribune.

MICHIGAN ISLAND

It comes to the surface along about the middle of August and goes down again about February 15. What causes it to act thus strangely is a conondrum that none has been able to solve, and the best efforts that have been put forth to keep it with us or compel it to remain in the depths have been alike without results.

On one occasion a number of farmers and teamsters resolved to put the island out of the floating business. In their efforts to do so they hauled many loads of stone and deposited them on it during the early part of the winter, believing that when it went down in February it would go down for good, weighted as it was with the stones. But the following August saw it bob up serenely from below—minus its load of stones.

At another time an effort was made to keep it on the surface and it was chained to the surrounding country with heavy log chains. When its time for departure came it departed—and the log chains departed with it. The log chains were never recovered.

Cutting Iron by Gas. Cutting Iron by Gas.

Most of our young folks have seen nictures projected on a screen by an oxhydrogen "limelight" stereopticon. In this double "magic lantern" a bright light is produced by the intense heat of burning oxygen and hydrogen together against a small cylinder of lime. The heat makes the lime shine very brightly, on the same principle that a piece of iron glows when the blacksmith takes it from his forge. Though this familiar form of burning gases is very hot, it is far excelled in heat by burning acetylene (a gas) in oxygen.

very hot, it is far excelled in heat by burning acetylene (a gas) in oxygen.

This intense heat has recently been used in a marvellous tool, the results of which seem almost if not quite like magic. The Davis-Bournonville Company has perfected a torch that burns oxygen and acetylene together, and makes it convenient to apply this intense heat in cutting off or welding iron.

iron.

Running this penlike flame across a thick sheet of iron melts a very narrow strip and cuts it off about as you might cut a sheet of ice with a red-hot poker. It will also melt the edges of two sheets or blocks of iron and enable a mechanic to fasten them together easily. Huge iron castings that have been broken may be remained by running the flame around. iron castings that have been broken may be repaired by running the flame around the edges of the fracture and "sticking" them together. From the mechanical point of view the possible uses of this new tool are very many. * * * The intensely hot flame melts a narrow open space through a piece of iron, even up to half an inch thick, almost as easily as would a red-hot wire melt through a very thin sheet of ice.—From "Nature and Science" in September St. Nicholas.

Thus, in many commercial centres abroad, is the rat being killed by the many thousands not because it is a menace to public safety, but because uses have been found for the heretofore worthless hide. The time may come when the rat will be hunted assiduously in this country, not only because of the money that's in it, but because it is our enemy.—Indianapolis News.
