CONFESSION OF A BRUTE.

Shot Wife in Head as She Raised Her Face to Kiss Him.

Didn't Think It "Worth White" to Go Back and Bury Her.

Frederick Gebhardt Admits Himself a Bigamist and Murderer.

New York, Oct. 25 .- A year and a nalf ago a friendless girl was murdered in a forsaken patch of woodland near Islip, L. I., a week ago her bleached skeleton was found, with nothing to indicate its identity but her jewelry and a bill of sale from a German shop; three days later, through the police of Ham-burg, Germany, her identity was estab-lished as Anna Luther, though the cables first carried the name as Latter; last night her husband, Frederick Gebhardt, was caught in Astoria, L. L., by a pho-tographer's flashlight, and to-night he confessed over his signature that he is the murders. Gebhardt married Anna dicate its identity but her jewelry and a confessed over his signature that he is the murderer. Gebhardt married Anna Luther under the name Otto Mueller.

The confession is as follows:
"About December, 1907, I first met
anna Luther We were married in Feb-"About December, 1907, I first met Anna Luther We were married in February, 1908, and went to Europe to live, We returned on April 6, 1908. She went to Henry Wertupp's in Newark, N. J., to spend a day or two. On the pretence that I was going to rent an apartment for us to live in, I returned to my home and wife in Astoria.

"I met Anna again on April 8th in Newark, and we went to an address in 34th street, New York, and then in Jamaica, L. I. We stayed at Jamaica until next day.

"On April 9th we went to Bay Shore, and we walked about, and I showed her some property. It got into an argument with her about some money matters, and I turned away and wanted to goback. She followed me up, screaming, and I shot her in the head. I did not look at her and don't remember whether I shot her more than once. Anna Luther

I shot her more than once.
"Immediately after I went to the Islip

"Immediately after I went to the Islip depot and took a train for home. It was nearly dark. On the way home on the train, I threw the revolver out of the car window.

"I want to state that I did not kill Anna Luther for her money, as the newspapers have stated. My original reason for marrying Anna was that I did not care to live with my first wife any longer, but as she—my first wife any longer, but as she—my first wifehad given me a child, my desire to again see my child caused me to want to get rid of Anna Luther and return to my first wife and child.

"This is the reason why I shot Anna the school-room, an excellent programme

"This is the reason why I shot Annauther, and I told her in Bay Shore
hat I was married and had a wife and child and must leave her. "She screamed and ran after me and kissed me, and wanted me back, and I Gebhardt told the police he never

Gebhardt told the police he never thought it "worth while" to go back to bury her. Instead he wrote letters to her friends in Newark and Germany, telling them that Anna was in poor health and had gone to Florida. Then he quit "bothering about her." Gebhardt, when he was in Germany, hought two German police dogs, and it was by tracing the dogs that the detectives found his home in Astoria. While a newspaper photographer chanced a flashlight at the dogs, the flare revealed the pale face of Gebhardt peering from the chinks of an outhouse. He was run down and arrested.
