IVANHOE.

As the wounded knight was about to address this fair and lovely apparition, she imposed silence by placing her slender finger upon her ruby lips, while the attendant proceeded to uncover Ivanhoe's side, and the lovely Jewess satisfied herself that the bandage was in its right place, and the wound doing well. She performed her task with a graceful and dignified simplicity and modesty, which might, even in more civilized days, have served to redeem it from whatever might seem repugnant to female delicacy. The idea of so young and beautiful a person engaged in attendance on a sick-bed, or in dressing the wound of one of different sex, was melted away and lost in that of a beneficent being contributing her effectual aid to relieve pain and to avert death. Rebecca's few and brief directions were given in the Hebrew tongue to the old domestic; and he, who had frequently been her assistant in similar cases, obeyed them without reply.

The accents of an unknown tongue, however harsh they may have sounded when uttered by another, had, coming from the beautiful and accomplished Rebecca, the effect of the charms pronounced by a fairy, unattainable indeed to the ear, but from the sweetness of utterance and benignity of aspect which accompanied them, touching to the heart. Without making an attempt at further question, Ivanhoe allowed them in silence to take the course they thought most proper for his recovery. And it was not until these were completed, and his kind physician about to retire, that his curiosity could no longer be suppressed. "Gentle maiden," he began in the Arabian tongue, with which his Eastern travels had made him familiar, and which he thought most likely to be understood by the woman who stood before him, "I pray you gentle maiden—"

But here he was interrupted by his fair physician, a smile which she could scarce suppress dimpling for an instant a face whose general expression was that of contemptive melancholy. "I am of England, Sir Knight, and speak English, though my dress and my lineage belong to another climate."

"Noble damsel," again the Knight of Ivanhoe began; and again did Rebecca interrupt him.

"Bestow not on me, Sir Knight," she said, "the epithet of noble. It is well that you should know that your handmaiden is a poor Jewess, the daughter of that Isaac of York to whom you were so lately a good and kind lord. It well becomes him and those of his household to give you such careful tendance as your present state demands."

I know not whether fair Rowena would have been satisfied with the species of emotion which the knight had hitherto felt for Rebecca. But Ivanhoe was too good a Catholic to retain the same class of feelings towards a Jewess. This Rebecca had foreseen, and it was for this very purpose she had hastened to mention her father's name and lineage; yet—for the fair and wise daughter of Isaac was not without a touch of female weakness—she could not but sigh internally when the glance of respectful admiration, not altogether unminged with tenderness, with which Ivanhoe had hitherto regarded his unknown benefactress, was exchanged at once for a manner cold, composed, and collected, and fraught with no deeper feeling than that which expressed a grateful sense of courtesy received from an unexpected quarter, and from one of an inferior race it was not that Ivanhoe's former carriage expressed more than that general devotion homage which youth always pays to beauty; yet it was mortifying that one word should operate as a spell to remove poor Rebecca, who could not be supposed altogether ignorant of title to such homage, into a degraded class to whom it could not be honorably rendered.

But the gentleness and candor of Rebecca's nature imputed no fault to Ivanhoe for sharing in the universal prejudices of his age and religion. On the contrary, the fair Jewess, though sensible her patient now regarded her as one of a race of reprobaton, with whom it was disgraceful to hold any beyond the most necessary intercourse, ceased not to pay the same patient and devoted attention to his safety and convalescence.

She informed him of the necessity they were under of removing to York, and of her father's resolution to transport him thither, and tend him in his own house until his health should be restored. Ivanhoe expressed great repugnance to this plan, which he grounded on unwillingness to give further trouble to his benefactors.

"Was there not," he said, "in Ashby, or near it, some Saxon franklin, or even some wealthy peasant, who would endure the burden of a wounded countryman's residence with him until he should be again able to bear his armor? Was there no convent of Saxon endowment, where he could be received? Or could he not be transported as far as Burton, where he was sure to find hospitality with Waltecoff the Abbot of St. Withold's, to whom he was related?"
