HON. SEYMOUR THURGOOD, and M. Beaufranc, editor of La Patrie, having been displaced at the recent change of leadership in the Bonaparte Party of Quebec, have severed their connection with it.

MR. PATERSON, who kept a stationery store at Annapolis, Nova Scotia, disappeared mysteriously a few evenings ago, and no trace of her has yet been discovered. She was a niece of Hon. Joseph Howe.

THE hearing of the petition against the return of John A. Matheson, Esq., a member of the House of Assembly, for the First District of Prince County, commenced yesterday, and was concluded today. Judgment will be given on Saturday next.

MR. ALEXANDER MCGLOTHLIN, of Halifax, just deceased, after leaving legacies amounting to over \$1,000,000, and about 250,000 acres of land, and a number of other valuable properties, has bequeathed the residue of his estate, valued, it is thought, in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars, to Dalhousie College.

"THEIR IS THE AMERICAN FLAG," remarked a citizen of the neighboring Republic, visiting the Montreal Carnival, as he passed the American Consulate the other day. He finished the sentence seated involuntarily upon a Canadian flag of a more solid kind, with both feet under him, as though they had been shot from a cannon.

MR. GEORGE MCNEIL, the New York publisher, who, at different times recently, offered a number of bursaries and exhibitions for competition at Dalhousie College, N. S., has now written another selection in honor of his friendship for that institution, by enclosing three tutorships, Latin, Greek, and Mathematics, at \$1,000 per annum each.

SENATORS CARVELL and HOWLAND, accompanied by their wives, crossed at the Capes last week, en route for Ottawa. Senators Montgomery and Haythorn are crossing today. L. H. Davies, Esq., and wife, left this morning, and Dr. Jenkins and Dr. MacIntyre will leave tomorrow. A. C. Macdonald, Esq., will not leave this week.

MR. SHAW, a Teacher in one of our public schools, was last week brought before the Stipendiary Magistrate, on a charge of assaulting one of his scholars. It appears that the master had punished the boy for an offence, and that the chastisement received was considered by the boy's father too severe, who accordingly brought the action. The Magistrate did not agree with the parent in his view of the matter, and dismissed the case, at the same time expressing the opinion that Mr. Shaw was an exemplary teacher.

DR. JEREMY BENTHAM ON "THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE RESOURCES OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND," before the Catholic Literary Union, in St. Patrick's Hall last Wednesday night, was very interesting and instructive. The Doctor pointed out the many advantages derivable from the improvement, not only within the reach of agriculturists compared with the disadvantages of the past, and of the necessity of increased facilities for the conveyance of our agricultural products to market. The lecture was listened to throughout with marked attention, and at its close a vote of thanks was tendered the Doctor. Hon. A. A. McDonald, Messrs. F. T. Newbery, A. McNeill, and others also made a few remarks.

THE Rev. Father Osborne, of the Society of St. John the Evangelist, Cowley, Oxford, England, which has branch houses in Boston and Philadelphia, has been holding a Mission at St. Peter's Church (Anglican), in this city, for the last ten days. The services have been frequent, lasting, with but short intervals, from 7.15 a. m. to 9 p. m. Father Osborne is an eloquent and effective preacher, and the Church has been crowded every night. The Mission will, no doubt, be attended with good results, and will close tomorrow morning, when the returned gentleman will proceed to Georgetown, and will hold Mission Services in Trinity Church, in that town, on Saturday next, 3rd February, at 7 p. m., and Sunday at 11 a. m., 3 p. m., and 7 p. m. These Services are free to all.

AN examination into the *Chabria* disaster reports that the collision was the fault of the *Chabria*.

THE Times says it seems probable that Deuler's Cabinet will be beaten in the Chamber of Deputies on Monday. A remarkable feature of the crisis is the rapidity with which Frenchmen of all opinions have begun to despair of the Republic.

THE officers of the steamer *Sultan* have been placed in jail, and the vessel seized by the police.

Over 3,000 congratulatory letters and telegrams were received by the Queen and Princess on the occasion of their silver wedding; also a hundred packages which have not yet been opened. The Emperor presented a massive silver tea service. The Queen of Denmark sent a marble statue of her late husband, King Christian IX.

THE Ministers had another conference with the committee of the Chamber of Deputies on the bills against the pretenders. After the departure of the Ministers, the committee adopted a proposition excluding from French Territory, Algeria, and the Colonies, all members of families having engaged in France, depriving them of political rights as citizens, declaring them ineligible to any office, and preventing them from being engaged in the army. The result of the committee further provides that transgressors of the proposed law shall be liable to a correctional tribunal, and liable to from one to five years' imprisonment, after which they shall be again eligible. The discussion revealed wide divergences of opinion between the members of the committee. M. Pons, inspired by the Ministry, called for permission to amend the proposed law. The answer was they would examine the matter.

Violent storms prevailed in Hungary on Friday, in the district of Oranitsa. Most of the houses were destroyed.

THE North German Gazette gives the text of a letter from the Emperor William to the Pope, dated Dec. 22nd. After hearty remarks of good wishes expressed in the letter from the Pope to the Emperor, the latter declares that the Pope's letter has strengthened his hope that the satisfaction felt by the Pope at the re-establishment of the Prussian legation at the Vatican, will afford grounds for His Holiness to reciprocate by similar advances. The Emperor believes the advance made by the Vatican, in regard to the duty of giving notice of ecclesiastical appointments to the Government, is even more to the interest of the Catholic Church than to the State. If the Emperor were convinced that his desire for an understanding were reciprocated, we would be able to concede that the Diet should reconsider the May laws, which are not permanently required for the maintenance of peaceful relations with the Vatican.

Joseph Brady, John Kelly, Lawrence Haslam, John Dyer, and Miss Kavanagh appeared in the Kilmalsham Court on Saturday, charged with conspiracy to murder Field, a special juror. Alice Carroll, aged 17 years, is so far that she saw Brady stab Field with a sword-cane or a dagger. Witness positively identified Brady, Kelly and Kavanagh. When Field fell he was stabbed by Brady or Kelly. The three men got on a car and drove off. The witness was then cross-examined, but her testimony was not shaken. She did not recall any until the reward was offered, but she said she did not "inform" in consequence of the reward.
