It would appear that Canadian farmers are much wealthier in the matter of herds than those of Great Britain. According to the latest returns of the board of agriculture there are in the Unit-ed Kingdom 2,460,086 cows, or one for every six of the popula-tion. By the census of 1891 there were in Canada 1,857,112 cows, or one for every 2.60 of the population. In proportion to population, therefore, Canadians have almost four times as many cows as have the people of Great Britain. In the number of cattle of all kinds, also, the Canadians are ahead, having 4,120,584 animals to 6.347,113 owned by the immensely greater number of people in Great Britain .- Montreal Gazette.
