LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

At a meeting of the Federal Cabinet held
on Friday, it was decided to summon Par-
liament to meet on the 22nd of this month.

At the election in Queens-Shelburne, N. S.,
on Wednesday last, Hon. Mr. Field-
ing, Minister of Finance, was returned by
a majority of about a thousand. No other
result could reasonably be expected.

The six Bruce left North Sydney for
Pictouville on Sunday morning, but had to
put back after being out in the storm ten
hours. Nearly everything movable was
washed from her decks.

The Hamburg correspondent of the
London Tribune reports the foundering of
the Russian steamer Jemina in the Gulf
of Bothnia. The captain of the steamer
and some thirty men were drowned.

Emperor William of Germany has
created the Duke of Connaught Field
Marshal of the Prussian army—an honor
rarely conferred on foreigners. The
Emperor Francis Joseph is the only other
foreigner holding a similar rank.

The Montreal Star says bluntly that
"to expect that any Canadian constituency
would reject the Finance Minister of a
Government sent of power for two or
three years, and the heir-apparent to
"the throne," would have been to ex-
pect a miracle."

A despatch received here from Moscow
of the News agency says a band of masked
robbers raided Lookinoff monastery, last
Sunday night. They killed the Abbot
General, the Prior and a Monk. They
despoiled the chapel of its sacred objects
and got away with a large sum of money.

At a meeting of the Provincial Govern-
ment held on Wednesday last, Mr. Mat-
thew Smith, M. L. A., was appointed a
member of the Executive, without por-
folio, as successor to the late Hon. George
Simpson, his former colleague, and Mr.
Henry Smith was appointed a member of
the School Board in place of Dr Taylor,
deceased.

In the death of Mr. John Bolger, pro-
prietor of the Railway House, a respected
and well known citizen, has departed. He
had only been ill a short time when he
succumbed. The late Mr. Bolger was
born in Ireland and for many years con-
ducted a hotel in Charlottetown. He was
a brother of Mr. Simon Bolger, proprietor
of the Ocean House here. Four daughters
are left to mourn their loss.

Referring to the resolve of the New-
foundland Government to test the validity
of the Modus Vivendi, the London Daily
Graphic says it has placed the Imperial
Government in an awkward predicament.
The incident's significant illustration of
the hearty and the consciousness with which
the Modus Vivendi was negotiated. It is
difficult to see what the Home Govern-
ment can do by way of fulfilling its pledge
to the United States, if Newfoundland
stands firm.

The schr. Omega coal laden for Char-
lottetown, was ashore at Fox Point, N. S.,
Sunday night and is a total wreck. The
crew were rescued in an exhausted con-
dition. The Omega had a cargo of coal
for the Rogers Hardware Co. She was
owned by Neil Sutherland, of St. Peter's
Canal, and commanded by Capt. McLean
of Charlottetown. The cargo was insured.

Daniel Fraser, a young man eighteen
years of age, son of David Fraser, carpenter,
McLellan's Brook, was killed at the works
of the Standard Drain Pipe Co., New
Gloucester, N. S., last Wednesday morning.
He was employed on the tramway used
for bringing clay into the plant and in
some way got under the wheels of the
car. He lived three hours but succumbed
to internal injuries. This is the first fatal
accident at the Drain Pipe Works.

On Thursday last, Feast of All Saints,
the high Mass in the Cathedral was sung
by Rev. Joseph Gallant, and the sermon
was preached by Rev. Dr. McLellan. His
Lordship the Bishop was present in the
Sanctuary. On Friday, Feast of All Saints,
Solemn Pontifical Mass of Requiem was
celebrated by his Lordship the Bishop,
with Rev. Dr. McLellan as deacon, and
Rev. Father Gaudes as sub-deacon, and
Very Rev. Dr. Morrison as Master of Cer-
emonies. After Mass the Libera was sung
and the absolution, at the catafalque, was
sung by his Lordship.

An express train from Boston to New
York, over the Boston and Albany rail-
road was stalled on the tracks of the New
York, New Haven and Hartford railway
at 16th street and Park Avenue, New
York on Thursday night. While in this
position the train was run into from
rear by a local train following. The two
hundred passengers on the express were
badly shaken up; but with the exception
of the brakeman of the express and one
woman passenger no one was hurt. The
brakeman was injured and sent to a
hospital and the woman had her nose
broken.

New York, Nov. 6.—Though both
sides are still claiming victory, indepen-
dent estimates of the returns so far indi-
cate that Hughes will be elected by be-
tween thirty and forty thousand majority.
Hearst carried New York City by about
sixty thousand and up state returns at
midnight gave Hughes about the same
majority outside the city with enough
places to bear from to make his election
sure. With the exception of Hearst
practically the whole Democratic state
ticket was elected and probably a majority
of Democratic Congressmen. In Massa-
chusetts, the Republicans are victorious,
carrying the whole state ticket and all
but one Congressional district. More-
over, former District Attorney, who was
Hearst's candidate for Governor, carried
Boston by twelve thousand but was
swept under by the state. Guild, has a
majority of about forty thousand. The
general returns from other states show
few surprises. The Democrats have made
considerable gains, but next Congress
will be about almost as strongly Re-
publican as the last.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

As there were no mails from Point du
Chene Monday we have not received our
Ottawa Weekly letter in time for this
issue.

Mrs. Macdonald, wife of the Captain of
the Turret Bell arrived in the city yesterday
morning from Cable Head accompanied by
her brother, Mr. H. P. Lawrence, C. E.
Mrs. Macdonald was on board the steamer
when she was driven ashore.

St. John, Nov. 5.—A fire which was un-
doubtedly of incendiary origin at John,
N. B., on Saturday night caused the
death of James W. King, a well known
commercial man, Maritime traveller for
W. H. Horne, and destroyed property to
the value of about \$25,000. Mr. King lost
his life in an effort to save the books from
the office of his brothers brush factory
which was badly gutted. He was over-
come by smoke, and before he could be
rescued was burned beyond recognition.
The fire broke out almost simultaneously
in the rear of W. F. and J. W. Meyer's
cigar shop, and under the floor of
William King's brush factory, both on
Waterloo street, in the middle of a wooden
block through which the flames made
great headway. Those two places and
Uggs's Laundry, together with several
small buildings were destroyed before the
flames were checked.

**The Halifax Caught in
the Storm.**

With her flag flying at half mast,
her deck houses battered and broken,
the crew of a shipwrecked fisherman
on board, and every one of her own
sixty-two passengers thankful to reach
dry land once more, the Plant line
steamer Halifax came into Boston
Saturday morning, twenty-four hours
overdue. From stem to stern the big
ship gave eloquent testimony of a fear-
ful North Atlantic hurricane, and the
signal of death at the masthead de-
noted that one of the crew, John Mc-
Lean, the ship's carpenter, had paid a
fearful tribute to the fury of the wind
and sea. Thursday last the full force
of the storm overtook the Halifax, and
for twenty-four hours terrific seas
washed the decks continuously, batter-
ing down the doors, flooding the
saloon and stripping off the woodwork
as though it had been paper. While
panic reigned in the cabin, and the
women passengers were plunged in
despair, Captain Ellis and his men
stuck manfully at their posts, and to
their heroic efforts the salvation of the
ship and its terrified passengers is due.
Mr. McLean was washed overboard
and lost in the darkness before there
was time to give the alarm or to throw
him a line.
