A Second Chamber.

Both Premier Asquith and Earl Rosebery have a common motive in propounding their rival schemes for reforming the House of Lords, and that is a desire to continue the existence of a Second Chamber of Parliament. In other respects their schemes as broadly outlined in their respective resolutions are widely divergent.

Lord Rosebery's plan to modify the composition of the membership without an express enactment dealing with its relation of the House of Commons.

The Rosebery plan appears to be at the first glance only a generous surrender of the legislative rights of the hereditary peers of the United Kingdom. Its effect will be far different. It takes away from the Crown its ancient and unlimited prerogative of creating members of the House of Lords and destroys the only effective means known to the Constitution of bringing the House of Lords into subjection to the Will of the People as declared at the polls. If the Ministry and the House of Commons should suffer the Crown to be deprived of this ancient right, exercised on the advice of a Ministry responsible to the House of Commons and in the last resort to the Electorate, and should substitute nothing as effective in its place, the Electorate would be deprived of its sole Political Sovereignty.

There would be established a competing political sovereign, co-ordinate in power with the present electorate. This new Sovereign would be the hereditary peers and their associates who would exercise the new House of Lords franchise. There would be two political sovereigns; one representing land, beer, banks, shipping, trade, a ring of capitalists; the other representing the common people.

Premier Asquith's plan is however far different. He proposes to weaken the power of the class Rosebery is endeavouring to strengthen. He is not concerned at present with the composition of the House of Lords. He is trying to take away from the House of Lords all control over Money Bills, and by this means to strengthen the power of the People. He is also desirous of limiting the power of the House of Lords over other legislation.

Yesterday we set forth reasons why some modifications is desirable in his proposal that three times of asking by the Commons in the same Parliament should be sufficient to place any legislation on the Statute book.

If Premier Asquith is successful with his bill to lessen the power of the House of Lords, he proposes after-

wards to deal with its membership. He will not be successful immediately. In any case his bill will be defeated in the House of Lords, just as the Rosebery bill will be thrown out in the House of Commons.

The policy of the two bills are diametrically opposite as we have shown, and the ambition of the two Houses are just as much opposed.

The Farmers' Meeting.

The farmers meeting which was held in the T. A. Hall this forenoon, was attended by a number of farmers.

Sir E. P. Morris opened the meeting and outlined what it was convened for. The agricultural societies are to be given a Government grant to be distributed in proportion to population; a quantity of seed oats are also being imported to be sold at cost, and a portable thrasher is also to be imported, the charge for the use of which will be nominal. A committee of 10 east and 10 west end farmers was appointed to draft rules and regulations for the societies to be approved by the Board of Agriculture. Messrs. Bennett and Kennedy also addressed the meeting.

Patriotic Dramatic Entertainment.

There will be a grand patriotic and musical entertainment in the Methodist College Hall on the 23rd inst. St. George's Night, in which leading musicians and theatrical people will take part. A scene from Shakespeare's "Midsummer Night's Dream" will be an enjoyable feature, and as the proceeds are to be devoted to Bishop Field College, we have no doubt but that a large audience will be present.

The sheep and lambs are never branded, and last season alone 28 animals were stolen on different persons all along the shore.

Two Workmen Crushed to Death.

SOUTH ROYALSTON, Mass., April 9.—Trapped within the huge bore, two men were carried down to death when four sections, each 3½ feet long, of a huge concrete chimney at the local plant of the American Woolen Co. collapsed to-day, and hurled down seventy feet to the ground. Louis Fornier, 25 years old, was dead when taken from the debris. Wm. Gray, 54 years old, of Bridgeton, Maine, died on a train while being rushed to Greenfield Hospital. Both men received terrible injuries.

A pathetic feature of the accident is that the chimney which was being built by a Chicago firm, was in charge of Chas. A. Gray, of Bridgeton, and a son of one of the victims.

The victims were at work within the upper part of the chimney when it crushed down carrying them with it. The cause of the accident is not known, but is supposed that the sections destroyed had not hardened sufficiently to withstand the weight of the men. Fornier leaves a wife and two children, and Gray two sons and a daughter.

City Council Meeting.

At the regular weekly meeting of the City Council held last night almost a full board was present. Mayor Gibbs presided.

Inspector General Sullivan wrote the Council suggesting that coal should be delivered in sacks to people along Water Street to prevent the sidewalk being taken up. He also asked for a list of the licenses on automobiles.

W. H. Peters wrote a letter about the excavation at the Deep Sea Mission site, which in the opinion of the Council's Engineer is a source of danger to the public. The Council will inform Mr. Peters that whilst they do not wish to hamper the work of the Mission they must see that the lives of the public are not jeopardized.

A letter was read from several people interested in five cent shows saying that the tax on the shows lately imposed was too heavy. The writer will be asked to read Mr. Burke's letters in the papers.

Messrs. Dawe, Strong, Ledrew and Newhook of LeMarchant Road asked for water and sewerage. The Council will do everything possible to comply with their wishes. The Engineer will also be asked to report.

The residents of King's Road asked for water. The Engineer will report on this also.

P. J. Hatton will be allowed to erect a shed on Clapp's ground for advertising purposes for one month only.

The plans of a garage for the Reid Nfld. Co. were approved, also plans of houses for E. Dawe, LeMarchant Road; E. Holwell, Gear Street. Mr. Murgford will be requested to submit plans of the building he is about to erect.

The Water Waste Inspector reported that there were quite a number of defective sewers to houses on New Gover Street and also leaky water pipes. The owners will be requested to have repairs made.

The Engineer reported on repairs to Cochrane Street sewer. Widening of Harvey Road would begin next week, also laying pipes on Cabot St.

After passing the weekly reports the meeting closes.

Six Dead From Poisoned Whisky.

Westerly, R.I., April 9.—Six deaths within the last few days, all apparently from poisoning as a result of whiskey drinking are to be investigated by the authorities.

Following the death last Thursday of Henry Larrow and Chas. R. Hood, Larrow's son-in-law, it was discovered that two women had died under similar circumstances within a day or two, and two more deaths ascribed to the same cause occurred. Wm. D. Perrin of Ashaway, four miles from here succumbed this evening to an illness which began last night after he had taken some whiskey, and at 2.30 to-night Edward Doherty of this city was added to the death list. Doherty was said to have purchased some liquor in Westerly for a cold, he took some of it last night and soon after became ill.
