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Christmas Dainties.

For candied peel, save the skins of oranges and lemons. Scrape off as much as possible of the inner white skin, then boil the strips for twenty minutes in water and then strain and make a syrup of the sugar and throw away the water. Cook a thick syrup of sugar and water and simmer the peel in this. This process must be thoroughly watched and stirred to prevent burning. Take the peels from the pan and roll them in powdered sugar. A small fancy box filled with candied peel makes a delightful gift. Candied fruits are made by cooking cherries, sliced pineapple, strawberries or segments of oranges in the same manner until they are firm and transparent. The candied fruits may be used if they are solid and whole. Mock candied cherries are made by cooking cranberries in a thick syrup until they are firm and candied.

Orange Cubes—Soak two ounces of sheet gelatin in one cup of water. Boil one cup of orange juice and four cups of sugar. Add the gelatin and cook twenty minutes. Add one cup of chopped almonds and one cup of chopped figs. Turn into a greased

pan and when perfectly cold, cut into cubes and dust with powdered sugar.

Turkish Delight.—Soak one ounce of gelatin in half a cup of cold water for about ten minutes. Weight one pound of granulated sugar and put in a pan with half a cup of cold water. Stand pan over the fire, and when sugar is melted and comes to the boiling point add soaked gelatin and boil steadily for twenty minutes. Flavor with rind and juice of one orange and the juice of one lemon. Wet a tin in cold water and turn mixture into it, leaving it about an inch in thickness, place walnuts or dried fruit in the jelly about an inch apart and stand away. When it is jellied, cut into inch squares and roll in confectionary sugar. A few chopped nuts are an improvement. Be sure to cook in a granite pan.

Mexican Kisses.—Two cups brown sugar, one scant cup milk, one tablespoon butter, one pound nuts cut in small pieces. Put sugar, butter, and milk into a saucepan, stirring until the sugar is dissolved. Cook until a soft waxy ball is formed in a cup of cold

water. Then take off the fire and put in the nuts. Beat until it gets stiff. When drop off tablespoon into a greased pan.—Bernice MacKay, 905 Dittus Avenue, Brooklyn.

Everton Toffee.—Take two cups of molasses, one pound of moist sugar and half a pound of butter. Cut the butter up in small pieces so that it can melt quickly, put it in the saucepan, then add the molasses, and then the sugar, stir it slowly with a knife over a clear fire, and when everything has become thick and of a nice brown color, drop a little into a cup of cold water. If it becomes crisp the toffee is done, and should be poured into a buttered plate.

Vanilla Caramels.—Boil together one pound of sugar, one gill oil cream, one ounce of honey, one quarter of a spoonful of butter and half a gill of hot water, till on dropping it into cold water it crackles on touching the bottom; then add a teaspoonful of vanilla and pour it out on to an oiled dish to cool. When cool cut into caramel squares.

Creamed Walnuts.—One cup white sugar, one-half teaspoonful vanilla, one-third cup of water, one cup of unbroken half walnut meats. Let the sugar and water boil until it will form a soft ball not brittle. Take from the fire and add vanilla. Stir until it begins to look milky; then pour in the cup of nut meats. Stir until they are all covered, and then take out on plates. If the meats stick together they can easily be pulled apart.

Peanut Brittle.—Shell the peanuts and remove the skins, then roll the nuts with a roller on a marble slab until they are as fine as possible. Measure the nuts, and for every half pint take one pound of granulated sugar. Put the sugar in a saucepan without a drop of water, let it melt very carefully, and when thoroughly melted and brown (not burnt) remove from the stove; stir in the peanuts at once, pour on a marble slab, and roll very quickly with a roller until thin as a wafer; then cut in strips.

Peanut Nougat.—Shell one quart of peanuts; remove skins and chop fine; sprinkle with one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt and keep in a warm place. Put two cups of sugar into a smooth granite ware saucepan or iron frying pan, place on the range and stir constantly until sugar is melted to a syrup, taking care to keep the sugar from adhering to the sides of the pan as well as to the spoon. Add nut meats and pour at once into two warm, buttered seven-inch square tins. Mark into small squares with a sharp knife.—M.

Maple Fudge.—For maple fudge, first get the genuine maple sugar, no imitation or half-and-half preparation, and grind it through a mill; this will make it light, and it will not pack in the cup. Take three cups of the ground sugar, one full cup of milk and a piece of butter as large as a small egg, mix all together and set over a hot fire. Cook till it boils away from the sides of the kettle, beating all the time. Then pour into a pan and beat until cold.

Fudge.—The following rule for fudge comes from one of the women's colleges, and it is particularly delicious: Boil three cups of sugar and one of milk together, after adding two or three squares of chocolate. Let the fudge boil until a little dropped on a cold saucer will harden. When stirred rapidly with a spoon. When this stage is reached add a tablespoonful of butter and a teaspoonful of vanilla. No molasses or other similar substance should be used—nothing but sugar, milk, chocolate, a little butter and flavoring. Rich cream is sometimes used instead of butter and milk. After testing it and adding the butter and flavoring, beat it till it begins to grow thick, and then pour it, before it hardens, into buttered pans.

Advice to Avoid Last Minute Despair Over "Another Name."

For the last moment gift one should always have at hand some boxes of candy and perhaps a few very fine flowers. One, for instance, might rather have a single orchid than all the carnations in the shops, while a gardenia is the most admired of all blossoms by the average young girl. Either of these exotic gifts may be tied up in a little box and decorated with a spray of fern or holly, so that it will look attractive.

For the big hearted woman who always at the last moment adds another name or two to her Christmas list what could be better than silk stockings? These she may buy and have on hand in assorted sizes, and when a name pops into her memory all she needs to do is to tie up the silken affairs in a pretty box and they are ready to send on their way. Having a few such auxiliary gifts in the house saves the busy woman much disappointment.

Horrible Tale of the Sea.

British Steamer Carrying Immigrants in Fearful Condition.

Washington Dec. 15.—Penalties aggregating \$1,500 were to-day imposed by the Department of Commerce and Labor upon the British steamer Overton, charged with what the department characterized as the worst case of neglect of steerage passengers ever brought under the passenger act of 1882.

The penalized vessel was employed to carry Spanish and Portuguese immigrants through Magellan Straits to Honolulu. Among the 1,242 passengers there were in the eight weeks of her voyage 53 deaths, 57 being children. The births numbered 14. The investigation further revealed that the sexes were not properly segregated and that inadequate ventilation increased the mortality. The general sanitary condition of the vessel including the hospital ward was found to be almost beyond belief.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 20. A lock-out affecting 100,000 cotton operatives is threatened for Christmas Day.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. Alexander McDonald, captain of the first English boat that crossed the Atlantic to try to lift the American Cup, died at sea on board the California, of which he was an officer.

BOSTON, Dec. 20. Rev. Richey, who is held on the charge of murdering his sweetheart, Avis Linnell, cut himself seriously in the groin to-day with a piece of tin. His condition is serious and an operation has been performed.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20. At the suggestion of Dr. Lyman Abbott and Dr. Mary Eddy, who spent many years in Turkey, President Taft took under consideration to-day the question of his tendering the good offices of the United States as a mediator in the Turko-Italian war.

TRIPOLI, Dec. 20. A small force of Italians which pushed out from Alhazra yesterday morning to reconnoitre, encountered a body of Turks who retreated after a short engagement. The Italians held their ground until this morning, when they returned to Alhazra.

LONDON, Dec. 20. A despatch from Johannesburg to the Express says that a diamond rush is on at Bloemhof, a farming district in the Transvaal, not far from Kimberley. A canvas town, with a population of 12,000, has sprung up within a month. Twenty thousand claims were officially announced on Saturday.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 20. The weavers of Helena Mills, Accrington, went out on strike to-night because of the employment of non-union labor. The strike threatens to spread to other mills in Lancashire, unless the employers meet the demands of the workers. Mill owners, on the other hand, threaten to retaliate by a general lockout, which will affect 100,000 operatives.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 20. A despatch to the Novoe Vremya, from Peking, gives a list of twenty-two proposals drawn up by the Chinese Cabinet for submission to the Shanghai Peace Conference. This scheme would make China a republic in everything but name. According to the proposals, the Emperor would remain, but power would be vested in the President of the Republic to be legally elected by two chambers.

LONDON, Dec. 20. According to a despatch from Rome, it is believed that Turkey is about to make peace proposals. The British Foreign Office has issued a statement that Turkey was informed in 1904 that Soltan in Paris, Eastern division of Tripoli, was included in Egyptian territory, and that occupation by the Egyptian troops is now a mere formality. It is believed, however, that Turkey never formally admitted this view.

GIBRALTAR, Dec. 20. Some uneasiness is felt here at the non-arrival of the steamer Macedonia from London to Bombay. The Princess Royal, with her husband, the Duke of Fife, their family and other passengers, from the wrecked steamer Delhi, are awaiting the arrival of the Macedonia to continue their voyage.
