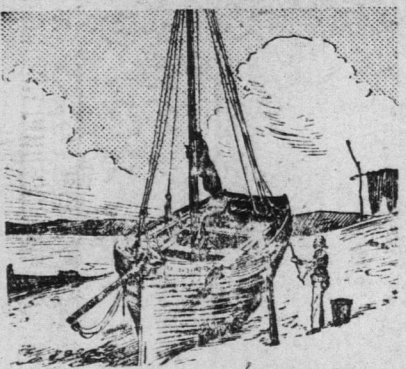

ROBERT EMMETT.

Executed 20th September, 1803.
On the 23rd June, 1803, a rebellion against the Government broke out in Dublin, in which Robert Emmett, at the time only twenty-three years of age, was a principal actor. It proved a failure. Emmett was arrested, having missed the opportunity of escape, it is said, by lingering to take leave of a daughter of Curran, the gifted orator, to whom he bore an attachment, which was reciprocated. On 19th September, 1803, Emmett was tried for high treason at the Sessions House, Dublin, before Lord Norbury, one of the Chief Judges of the King's Bench, and others; was found guilty and executed the next day.
At his execution Emmett displayed great fortitude. As he was passing out of his cell, on his way to the gallows, he met the turnkey, who had become much attached to him. Being fettered, Emmett could not give his hand, so he kissed the poor fellow on the cheek, who, overcome by mingled condolence and tenderness of the act, felt senseless at the feet of the youthful victim, and did not recover till the latter was no longer among the living.

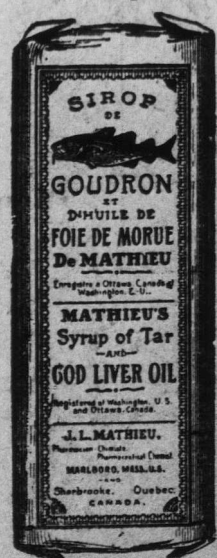

LONDON, Sept. 19.
A black hand message, signed Painters, has been received by Sir John Henry Bethell, Bart, M.P., a prominent Director of the London and South-Western Bank, demanding that a hundred pounds be placed under the steps of Wansted Old Church at 6 a.m. Sept. 19th, and threatening death in default, and dire disaster if Scotland Yard were communicated with. The latter Sir John promptly did, and detectives awaited developments, when a dummy package was placed in hope of catching the black mailers.

LONDON, Sept. 19.
Not a single motorcar or conductor employed by the Tillingales went to work this morning, and many bus lines were entirely suspended, causing great inconvenience. A few old horse omnibuses appeared, the first time for several years. There were no disturbances. The strikers surrounded the sheds, expecting their comrades to join them at midnight. Several conferences were held this morning. Practically the entire press of London supports the men, many newspapers declaring that the matter of wearing Union badges should never have been raised.

BLOOMINGTON, Sept. 19.
In a demoniacal fit of insanity Mick Hurst, aged 50, a stonemason, blew up his home with dynamite this morning, killing himself and a daughter, fatally wounding two other daughters and demolishing the house. Mrs. Hurst miraculously escaped. She says the man woke the family at 2 a.m. and told them to gather in his bedroom. He then closed and locked the door, speaking only these five words—"We will all die together." He picked up a dynamite stick which was lying on the floor near him, and threw it under the bed. There was a deafening roar, and Mrs. Hurst remembers nothing more till she came to consciousness at the home of a neighbor an hour later.

SCARLET FEVER.—Yesterday afternoon scarlet fever was reported to the Health Authorities from McNeil Street. Three inmates in one house are down with the disease. The patients were taken to the Fever Hospital last evening.
