**CRITICISM VERSUS FAULT-FINDING.**

**Auto Accidents.**

Automobiles have killed three children in Cape Breton within a week. Such a tragic toll cannot but raise a presumption of negligence, which may not be rebutted by claims that the "rules of the road" were observed in all cases, or that there was no convenient place for the little ones to play other than on the highway or the public street.

The rules of the road, like all other rules, regulations and laws, are made to govern the conduct of adults—or at least of persons of responsible intelligence—with reference to one another. The tooting of an automobile horn gives no one the moral right to continue at speed along a road where irresponsible tots are at play. The only safe and proper course in such cases, is to slow up or stop long enough to ensure against accident. Speeding in the city or any of the towns can only be described as criminal recklessness in any case. In Sydney the menace of the speed foot has become even greater than it was a year ago. The number of inexperienced and irresponsible motorists has increased. It is admitted that the police force of this city is relatively light in number and that it has more than enough to do quite apart from keeping the auto traffic under surveillance. But whatever police work has to be neglected, that of curbing the speed fool should be scrupulously performed, for the matter involved is nothing less than the protection of men, women, and children against the peril of injury which, as the evidence at hand proves, may result in fatalities. A few examples made, at the beginning of the season, of reckless or ignorant motorists, will make the work of the traffic cop progressively lighter as the summer advances.

Equally important is it that parents should as far as possible, keep their children off the streets and the public highways at this season of the year. To do this in Sydney, with its dearth of parks and recreation grounds, is particularly difficult, but it is the only way of safety. Children of tender age should not be allowed even to cross the streets in the motor season, unless accompanied by those who are able to look after them. There is not a street in this city, or for that matter in any Cape Breton town, which is a safe playground for young children during the summer months. Where parents refuse to recognize and be governed by these obvious facts, the case becomes one calling for the intervention of the officers of the law.

The warnings which have already come in this connection are surely impressive enough to bring before the public authorities the urgent need of enforcing every precaution to regulate motor traffic in this city, and in all the towns of Cape Breton.—Sydney Record.

**Gold Under Fossils.**

In Alaska the bones, and often the entire bodies, of extinct animals, such as the mammoth, the mastodon, the reindeer and the bison, are found most abundantly in the layers of soil directly above the gold-bearing gravels. So intimate is this association between fossil animal remains and the auriferous deposits that many explorers who have visited Alaska say that the fossils serve the prospectors as indexes of the metallic richness of the soil.

In ancient times both the gold and the bones and bodies of the animals were deposited at the bottom of valleys by the action of rivers and smaller streams, many of which have now disappeared. Consequently, the appearance of fossils is an almost certain indication that gold will be found in the neighborhood, the cabins of many miners are ornamented with huge tusks and antlers, unearthed in the diggings.

The luckiest girl in England to-day is Miss Gwendoline Thomas, of Liverpool, who drew Captain Cuttle in the Calcutta Sweepstake. It is true that, being a wise woman, she sold half her ticket beforehand for a substantial sum, but even so her other half brought her about £68,000.





**Making Trains Safe.**

**MECHANICS WHO PREVENT RAILWAY ACCIDENTS.**

The public does not realize the important part played by when examining in making our railways the safest in the world.

At large stations these mechanics may be seen tapping the wheels of carriages and wagons with their long-handled hammers. They are all trained fitters. Their duties comprise chiefly inspection of the wheels, axle-boxes, springs, and brakes.

One of the most usual occurrences which delay the examiner in his tour of inspection is an overheated axle.

**The Danger Card.**

Other defects for which the man with the hammer looks are bent axles, defective brakes, and faulty couplings. In the case of a bent axle, there must be no attempt to straighten it at once. The wheels must be taken off and sent to the repair shop. There the axles are heated before being straightened.

When the wheel examiner finds anything wrong, he takes two cards from his pocket, enters thereon the necessary particulars, and fixes them to both sides of the carriage or wagon. He must also report the matter to the guard.

These cards are of two sorts. One, a red card, bears the words "Not to go," and indicates of course, that the carriage must be left behind.

The other card is green on one side and white on the other. The green side bears the words "For repair," and must be addressed to the nearest repair station. This means that the repairs cannot be done locally, but that it will be safe for the carriage or wagon to travel to where the work can be done.

**Finding Faults.**

The white side of the card gives the information "Defective brake," which shows that the vehicle is unfit to travel.

The wagons of colliery proprietors and coal merchants, and the vehicles of other companies, must be examined and passed by the wheel examiner before they are permitted to travel over the lines he represents.

A bent axle, a snapped coupling, a bent axle—any of these faults might cause considerable loss of life. The fact that accidents from such causes are so unusual is a tribute to the vigilance and efficiency of the man with the hammer.
