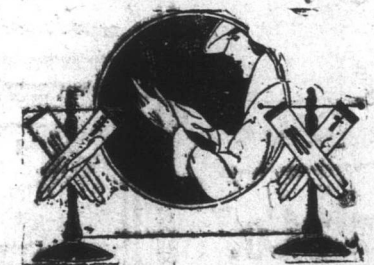

Mount Cashel Garden Party.

ANNUAL FESTIVAL A GREAT SUCCESS.

The annual Garden Party in aid of Mount Cashel Orphanage, held yesterday afternoon, proved a great success and it is expected that the receipts will equal, if not exceed last year's record. The affair opened at 3 p.m. but long before that hour hundreds of people were on the grounds and all during the evening motor cars, buses and carriages were kept busy. Amongst the distinguished visitors present were His Grace, the Archbishop, who remained throughout the greater part of the afternoon. Lord Morris and Sir Edgar Bowring, High Commissioner at London. The grounds were splendidly laid out, whilst the stalls and tables were replete with everything to attract the eye and lighten the pocket book. The energetic ladies were kept busy attending to the requirements of their patrons. The various athletic events in connection with the affair were well contested, the football event being particularly interesting. All the League teams competed and after close contests the Cadets and Star were left in the finals. This game resulted in a win for the Cadets by a score of two goals to nil. Mooney and Christopher being the goal-getters. The winning team were W. Clare, M. Maddigan, R. Mooney, W. Callahan and T. Christopher, who received handsome gold medals. The silver medals were won by the Star team composed of the following:—B. Hart, W. Hart, J. Alsop, W. Flynn and R. Nolan. The R. G. Reid cup was won by the B.I.S. baseball team, who defeated the Wanderers after a good exhibition by a score of 3 to 0. Donnelly pitched for the Wanderers and Aspell was in the box for the Irish, while Empires Chessman and Joe Murphy controlled the game. The pony and horse races were run in heats, and in the finals for the latter, the result was as follows:—1st, James; 2nd, Baird; 3rd, J. Gibbs. In the pony race Martins mount came first Baird's second, Butler's third. The different events were carried out under the supervision of Mr. W. J. Higgins, with Messrs. J. P. Crotty, and C. E. Hunt as assistants, whilst the judges in the pony and horse races were Messrs. T. Curran, M. O'Regan and Gus Lester. Lovers of music and dancing had their tastes catered to and the dancing by the Orphanage boys was highly commented upon. The new brass and reed band under command of Capt. Arthur Bulley rendered many pleasing selections, the talent of the boys surprising the auditors. The C.I.B. and C.C.C. Bands were also in attendance and were up to their usual high standard. The affair was concluded with a big dance in the Recreation Hall, which lasted till an early hour this morning, the music being furnished by the Cadet Band. The police, and particularly the Mounted Police, did exceptionally good work regulating traffic. The committee and all those who helped in any way are to be congratulated on the satisfactory manner in which the affair was carried out.

POOR FISHING ON SOUTHERN LABRADOR.

The following message was received yesterday from Sir Michael Cashin, who is making a tour of the island in S.S. Cabot:—

"Battle Harbor, via Fogo: Arrived here this a.m. after visiting about twenty settlements. The fishery is bad from Cartwright to here, but splendid reports are coming from north and all the floaters have gone there."

Sir Michael expects to reach St. John's early next week.

Fog Alarm Necessary.

The Government should, while about to complete its job of making Argentina the South Coast Eastern terminal, by the erection of a fog alarm on Fox Island, and the placing of bell or automatic whistling buoys to mark the shoals off the harbor. Such aids to navigation would be of incalculable value to masters of steamers making the port of Argentina in thick weather. The Department of Marine and Fisheries should attend to this matter immediately.
