EXPERTS HOPES. Every branch of flying-research, invention, commercial, sport, war, and peace will be advanced by the great motor-gliding contest next September, when a Daily Mail prize of £1,000, open to the world, will be awarded to the competitor who flies the longest distance over 50 miles with a small handy popular lowpowered mroplane over a triangular

A contest will be held at the same place and time and under the same rules for a prize of £500 offered by the Duke of Sutherland for purely British competitors flying British machines. It will be possible for one competitor to win both prizes with one flight.
