on board the Herbert Green. Gny Shears, sworn and examined-Witness remembered Saturday night July 4th, when he made a friendly visit or Capt. Bryne of the Orleans about nine o'clock. Upon arriving there, Capt. Bryne was talking to Cusoms Officer Kendrick in the cabin. Byrne asked witness if he was acquainted with Kendrick to which he replied "No." After being introduced the captain stated that Kendrick was going to fix him up on board the Herbert Green. The conversation in the cabin then was about liquor and dogs. He remembered Kendrick stating that it would be all right to get the liquor. Kendrick went on to say that the duty had been paid on it, that it was out of bond and that it was not smuggling to bring it to his vessel. Shortly after Capt. Bryne took some notes out from his pocket and counted \$32 or \$33, and stated he did not have enough money to buy the liquor. Capt. Bryne then asked witness if he had any funds, or if he could obtain any. Witness thought he could do something, and as Bearns' grocery was the nearest place, he thought he could get one of his own cheques cashed there until Monday. Witness hurried off to the store before it closed. This was about ten o'clock. Witness secured \$100 and proceeded directly to the Orleans. Capt. Bryne was then alone, Kendrick having left the vessel shortly after witness left. Witness was gone no longer than fifteen minutes, and as far as he knew Kendrick was on board when he left to get the money. Bryne and witness then left the Orleans for the Furness Withy pier. New General Against the Riffians

PARIS, July 6.—Supreme command of the French forces opposing the Riffians in Morocco is to be taken from Marshal Lyautey, the governor general and entrusted to a general who will leave France immediately for the

This decision, which is subject to ratification by the cabinet to-day, was reached at a council of war held last night under the chairmanship of M. Painleve, the Premier, and War Minister. The step is being taken, it is explained, to allow Marshal Lyautey freedom in carrying out his administrative and political duties.

The man selected for the post is understood to be General Guillaumat, commander in chief of the Allied operations in the Balkans during the World War.
