The desire of your Directors throughout the negotiation was to secure the completion and working of the road, so as to obtain the traffic from a new district of Ontario over this Company's line.

The road, 102½ miles in length, forms a connection between Southampton on Lake Huron (which is a shipping point to Lake Superior) and Guelph, the terminus of this Company's Galt and Guelph branch.
