LONDON AND PRECINCTS.

Miss Maud Shepherd, of St. Thomas, has been visiting friends in this city.

Miss Lilly Arnun, of this city, has been the guest of Miss Cook, of Stratford.

Evangelists Crossley and Hunter begin a series of meetings in Brantford on Sunday evening next.

Rev. Mr. George will conduct services in Trinity school house on Friday night—(St. Thomas Times).

Squire Jarvis yesterday again adjourned the case of Chapman vs. Water Commissioners for one week.

Mr. Isidore F. Hellmuth, after identifying Birchell at Niagara Falls, was retained by him for the defence.

Mr. William Magee has sold his new brick house, 523 Dundas street, to Mr. Wm. Yates, who will occupy it.

Mr. John Murray, of this city, has purchased the site of a new residence in Woodstock previous to departing for Cincinnati, where he has secured a good position.

After attempting for years to conceal the impurity of its water supply, Toronto has been given away by the Telegram, which remarks: "City water, thy name is mud."

Mr. F. C. Freeland, of this city, has taken charge of the gens' furnishings department at John White & Co.'s, Woodstock. His base profound will be greatly missed from the Congregational Church choir.

The litany service and holy communion will be held in St. Paul's Cathedral tomorrow at 10 a.m., and the annual business meeting of the W. A. M. A., Diocese of Huron, will be held in Victoria Hall at 2:30 p.m.

Rev. Dr. Cochran, of Brantford, lectured to the inmates of the Insane Asylum at that institution last evening. During the winter a number of leading gentlemen from the various denominations have given their services in this way, and the result has been that much enjoyment has been afforded the inmates.

"Boots' Baby" at the Grand Opera House to-morrow evening promises to attract one of the largest audiences of the season. The leading parts are taken by Miss Kate Claxton and Mr. Chas. Sturgeon. On the occasion of the former appearance of "Boots' Baby" in this city the house was crowded.

Even the customary rounders failed to put in an appearance at the Police Court this morning, and the business of the session was hurried through in short order. The only offenses registered were two charges of drunkenness, one of which was against an old woman. The woman was discharged, but as the male prisoner did not appear his case was laid over.

The late Henry D. Lee, of Port William West, formerly of this city, was buried at Port Arthur Cemetery on Tuesday last. From communications received in this city it is learned that the immediate cause of his death was apoplexy. He had been subject to attacks of neuritic headache for some time previous to the sad event. The Port William Journal is in the meantime being conducted by W. A. McPhalen.

It may not be generally known that Prof. Robertson, the recently-appointed dairy commissioner, came to Canada from Scotland in 1875 and assisted in the exportation of cheese to the farm in London Gore. Afterwards he learned the cheese-making business in the Salford factory of Mr. James Harris in 1876. He was engaged by the North Branch Cheese Manufacturing Company, of London township, to run their factory in 1877. He spent four years in that factory.

Massive Vist.

R. W. Bro. W. B. Doherty, district deputy grand master of this district, paid a visit to the Lodge, No. 195, A. F. & A. M., G. R. C., an official visit last evening at the Masonic Temple. The attendance of members and visiting brethren was large and the evening proved very interesting. The secret work of the first degree was exemplified by the officers of the lodge in a manner which did honor to themselves, and was a credit to Tassan Lodge. The members were then invited to the banqueting room by the district master and a fine oyster supper was partaken of. Short speeches were delivered by several members, including the visiting R. W. brother, which with songs and other forms of amusement caused a couple of pleasant hours to pass rapidly.

St. John's Parish Club.

Mr. H. P. Macklin's essay on "Money," read last evening before this club, proved a very interesting brochure on the subject, the gentleman's strong point being the adoption of a national currency, in view of the fact that the bank charters this year expire, and that the profits from such a medium should increase the wealth of the country and not the shareholders of the moneyed institutions. Several of his arguments, however, were strongly combated by a number of the members, and a lively discussion on its merits took place after the conclusion of its reading. Next Monday evening the meeting will be of a purely social character, interspersed with songs and readings, and other amusements incident to such an occasion.

A large number of happy-faced children and four nannies filled the London West Methodist Church last evening on the occasion of the anniversary of the Sunday school. A lengthy programme of dialogues, recitations, songs and kindergarten songs and choruses was presented by the little folks to the satisfaction and enjoyment of all present. Went to Port Stanley.

Mayor Taylor, Alderman Murray Anderson and Alderman Charles Taylor went to Port Stanley yesterday on invitation of the reeve of Yarmouth, and, in company with that gentleman and Mr. Price, of the village, inspected the harbor with a view to ascertaining the repairs necessary. They went to the east side pier and found it badly decayed, portions of it crumbling down. In places the lake has commenced to wash the shore, and it will take but a short time to destroy the harbor completely. Hundreds of cords of stonework have been displaced and stonework blocks up a large portion of the harbor. "Where vessels used to be able to turn round," said Mayor Taylor, "they cannot even enter now." Captain Berry has a small schooner there which draws 6 feet, and it has to be backed out of the harbor. At the mouth we found 9 or 10 feet of water, which with stormy weather would not admit a boat drawing 7 feet. Vessels now have to run 60 miles to Rondeau from that portion of the coast in case they want shelter. The entire party expressed their intention of bringing the matter before the Government by means of a deputation as soon as possible. The last dredging is said to have been done there six years ago, and the apparatus for the work does not contain any machinery at all now; where it has disappeared to nobody knows.
