Simply these, that should any person take cold, become sick, or die on account of said exposure, that damages could be obtained, for I fail to see any difference in the responsibility of a corporation to rur over a man with a street car or give him hid death of cold in the court house. Certainly not much difference to the man. Jurors and others from the country will not long allow themselves to be imposed upon. If a word to the wise is not sufficient, recourse to law must be had. The idea of keeping men shivering in their overcoats in the court house is outrageous.

In reference to good order, it is not to be wondered at if at times when Mr. Schram, hearing a hum of noise in the court, may be led to believe that it comes from the auditorium, when in reality in many cases it comes from the bottom of the pit (certainly not the bottomless one), where all the lawyers go to. I submit that lawyers who are not on the case have no more right to disturb the court by talking than others, and I think a constable should be located among them to keep them straight. Yours truly,
