### charming. LOCAL ARCHITECTS KICK

Against the Free Library Board's Action

In Accepting Herbert Matthews' Plan for the Building-The Deeision Stands,

The Free Library Board was met last night in the City Hall by Mr. Herbert Matthews, the New York architect who submitted plans for London's new library building, which were recently accepted. Mr. Matthews came here on hearing of his success, and in three weeks will return to London again and personally superintend the work on the building. The members present were Chairman Macklin, Messrs. Robert Reid, James Egan, E. R. Cameron, Joseph Marks, George Burrell, R. H. Dignan and Secretary Keene. Preliminaries were discussed to a great extent. The perspective; of the new building was such as made the board doubt whether it could be built for the estimated amount, but Mr. Matthews gave the assurance that it could be done. He expected to bring the cost greatly within the mark, which would give him an opportunity to have a more ornate building than was originally intended. Mr. Egan was in a hurry to have the enlarged plans for the contractors prepared within two weeks, which would allow operations to be begun before Nov. 1. This, it was stated, was impossible, but the promise was made to have them ready in three weeks, tenders called for and work under way by the above date. Messrs. Moore & Henry objected to the action of the board in accepting Mr.

Matthews' plans, giving their reasons as "We were instructed to make the size of the building 50 by 80 feet, and the conditions were accompanied by a sketch drawn to a scale, and showing the building to be of those dimensions. All the designs submitted, with one exception, were made to comply with that condition, whereas the only one which ignored that portion of your instructions was awarded first place, notwithstanding the fact that it has a frontage of 100 by 80 feet. There is a vast difference between 4,000 square feet of floor space within walls of given dimensions and the same space covering an unlimited area. Therefore, if the conditions were allowed to be altered for one competitor all others should undoubtedly in common justice be given an equal opportunity. We therefore respectfully beg to submit that we have been led by your advertisement into the expenditure of considerable time and money, and that in justice to all the architects who submitted designs you should reconsider your decision at the earliest possible date, and that the award should be made to the best

design conforming to the condition." The plans had been accepted and the board did not feel inclined to reverse their decision. The general opinion was that the successful architect had not overstepped the specifications, and the letter will be answered by the secretary and the views of the board set forth.
