MUST CLEAN THE STREETS

Board of Works Policy of Better Late Than Never—A Miscellany of Business.

The board of works last night availed of a realization of the need of cleaning the streets.

The chairman, Ald. Parnell and the engineer, Mr. Graydon, upon the request of Lieut.-Col. Holmes, D. C.

Residents on Elmwood avenue between Edward and Cathcart streets, petitioned to be allowed one-half of the cost of a walk laid last year.

Engineer Graydon will report as to the tearing up of a sidewalk on Bathurst street between Coburne and Waterloo streets, considered in a dangerous condition.

Petitioners for an addition to the sewerage on Front street will ask the recorder to order the work.

Mr. Holmes, one of the petitioners, asked the committee if, for the sake of \$125, they were going to allow the work to be done.

The recommendation to take over London Lane was reaffirmed.

A claim for \$101.50 was put in an account of charges sustained by Mrs. J. Henry on all mail from the city.

The committee will recommend that an offer of \$75 be made.

Two orders were received for the construction of a new water main street, from John street, to Central avenue.

Five Men Hurt—Fireman Boler Supposed to Be Fatally Injured—Driver Miller Badly Scalded.
