Bloemfontein, Tuesday, March 13 .- As Lord Roberts was being conducted to the town today by the deputation of officials which had gone out to mest him, he was greeted by great crowds of people, cheering and waving handkerchiefs and displaying the utmost ENTHUSIASM AND CORDIALITY.

Lord Roberts first entered the market square, thence proceeded to the parliament house, and from there to the presidency, which he entered from the front. The garden of the late president's pretty house was instantly entered by the crowd, which broke out with tremendous energy into "God cessions until the receipt of Lord Sal-Save the Queen." REFUSED TO FIGHT AGAINST THE BRITISH.

Then that portion of the troops necessary to man the northern heights be gan to march through the town, amid the cheers of the people. When the horse batteries passed, the contrast between the well-fed citizens and the exhausted and worn-out gunners, who sat their horses and caissons without a sign of emotion, was most striking. By this time the plain outside the fantry regiments and immense transport convoys, which seemed to overrun the ground like water. Gradually out of the chaos order emerged, each brigade and transport establishing it-self in its proper position in long, straight lines miles in extent. From the higher kopje near the town to far beyond could be seen a long yellow serpent representing regiment after regiment of khaki-clad troops marching on the town.

JOUBERT DID NOT COME. Gen. Joubert was expected here early in the morning, but the blowing up of the line north of the town prevented his coming. He remained at Brandfort with 2,000 Natalers.

Gen. Prettyman is succeeding admirably as governor of the town. He issued a proclamation today requesting the burghers within a radius of ten miles to deliver up their arms, assuring them they would be paid for the confiscation of their property Lord Roberts is about to issue fresh proclamations which it is believed will have the effect of disarming opposition upon the part of the Free Staters.

Secretary Reitz Replies to Lord Salis bury's Statement.

Pretoria, Wednesday, March 14.—Sec-retary Reitz's refutation of Lord Salis-bury's argument in reply to the Bloem-fontain to be a second of the Bloemfontein joint note was issued today.

Mr. Reitz says: "Great Britain after
the Bloemfontein conference, tried to
enforce by threats certain changes in the internal government of the Trus-vaal Republic, contrary to the London convention. They also imported troops in great numbers, and broke off negotions with a threat to take their own means to remove the grievances of their subjects. After waiting a fort-night, during which an army corps was prepared and the reserves were being called out, President Steyn asked the reason of these proceedings. Sir Alfred Milner refused to reply. Mean-while Mr. Chamberlain, in his speeches, showed the world that England had decided on war. Accordingly the Trans-vaal government addressed to the British government a demand for the removal of their troops, as otherwise it would accept the presence of the troops as a declaration of war. This was not necessarily intended as a mes-sage of war."

Concerning the armaments, Mr. Reitz said: "Those were bought openly in England, in Europe, and the high commissioner boasted full knowledge of them at the Bloemfontein conference, and also a full description of those armaments were found among the officers' papers at Dundee. Both the army and the ultimatum were protective measures, subsequent to the raid and to the discovery of hidden cables.
